#### 3.0 **CONSTITUENT REPORTS**

#### Retirees Association

Mr. Jones reported the following on behalf of the Retirees Association:

- Mr. Jones began by congratulating the College on reaching 10,000 students for the first time.
- The 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Homecoming Weekend will be held at the Chatham Campus September 29, 2017 October 1, 2017.
- The Retirees Fall Social will be held October 19, 2017 at the home of P. Chortos.
- The Retirees Association have scheduled a breakfast meeting with the President France -in October.
- The Christmas Socials will be held Wednesday, December 6, 2017 in Chatham, ON at Country View Golf Course and the Windsor Christmas Luncheon and Show will be at St. Clair Centre for the Arts on Saturday, December 16, 2017.
- The winter trip that was planned for Mexico has been cancelled due to lack of participation.

- The Retirees Association will present the second installment of their annual commitment to the SportsPlex fundraising efforts at the Christmas brunch.
- The Bridge Club, the Archives project, Folklore, weekly golf outings, educational projects and more are ongoing.
- Mr. Jones and Ms. S. Davies, both retirees of St. Clair College cochaired the Walk for Parkinson's and were successful in raising more than \$50,000 for research.

#### **Faculty**

Mr. Vrantsidis reported the following on behalf of the Faculty:

- Fall start-up was very busy and successful. Faculty and students are now settling into the new semester and returning to a normal pace.
- On September 14, 2017 the Faculty at all Ontario Colleges voted to provide the Ontario Public Service Employees Union (OPSEU) with a strike mandate if necessary. There is hope that a settlement will be negotiated.
- The Advertising program secured two national level speakers, Amy Brown and Chris Midori, both successful in the advertising industry.
- Four students enrolled in the Entertainment Technology program travelled to Macau, China over the summer to work on the set of the House of Dancing Water, a \$500 million dollar production.
- The Educational Support Club has raised \$1200 that was donated between the Family Respite Super Saturday Program and the Greater Essex County District School Board (GECDSB) Breakfast Program.
- Second year students from the Architectural, Civil and Construction Engineering programs will be assisting with the National Pre-Cast Event being held October 5, 2017 at Prestressed Systems. There will be a presentation and an open plant tour of the precast concrete manufacturing facility.

#### Student Representative Council

 Mr. E.P. Chant presented the Board with 2017-2018 Day Planners that were also supplied to students. The front cover of the planner was designed by Matt Shaheen. Mr. Shaheen was the winner of a contest among the first-year Graphic Design students in the spring of 2017.  The Saint Scene magazine that was published in hard copy 4 times annually has been discontinued in favour of an on-line "e-zine". The content of the e-zine is updated daily.

#### 4.0 **PRESIDENT'S REPORT**

The President reported to the Board on the following key initiatives:

- The 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Homecoming Weekend is being held at the Chatham Campus September 29, 2017 through October 1, 2017. The events will include the unveiling of the Alumni of Distinction wall, Flashback Friday, on Saturday there will be an OCAA Saints Men's Baseball Double Header as well as Solid Gold Saturday Night and the weekend will wrap up with Family Fun Day on Sunday.
- Orientation week and Fall 2017 start-up were extremely successful and St. Clair College achieved a record enrolment of 10,000 full time students for the first time in its history. The President acknowledged the hard work and efforts of the staff, SRC, TSI, SAA and the Retirees Association who all assisted in this achievement. This success exemplifies the excellence in the College's teaching and learning as well as our service excellence that we provide to the students.
- Ms. France stated that negotiations between Faculty of the 24
  Ontario Colleges and the College Employment Council is ongoing as
  the Collective Agreement expires on September 30, 2017.
  Administration is hopeful that these negotiations will continue and a
  resolution will be reached.
- The President reported that the Media releases that have been emailed to the Board cover the period from July 2017 to September 25, 2017. She brought to the Board's attention the many positive stories relating to St. Clair College. The Media releases are attached to the minutes as item #4.0.
- Ms. France referred to the email previously sent to the Board regarding the restructuring of the Ministry of Advanced Education and Skills Development (MAESD) that will take effect in mid -October. She stated that Glenn Craney has been announced as the new ADM for the Post Secondary Education Division and Greg Orencsak will be replacing Mr. Sheldon Levy as Deputy Minister.

- The Board has engaged the use of a facilitator; John McVean, who
  assisted the Board at the planning session held in January 2016.
   Mr. McVean was an executive with HRDC, and is also
  knowledgeable regarding the College system.
- Mr. James Marsh, Chair, School of Business and Information Technology, will also be a guest speaker at the Board Retreat.
- The focus of the Board Retreat will be on innovation and on establishing St. Clair College as a destination college.
- Team building activities are also scheduled for the session.

#### 7.0 MONITORING REPORTS

#### 7.1 <u>2017 Fall Enrolment/Registration Report: Domestic and International</u>

Mr. M. Silvaggi, Associate Vice President Student Services and Registrar, reviewed the enrolment statistics provided in the Board report. He also provided a PowerPoint presentation and highlighted the following key points:

- Registration statistics show an overall increase in enrolment:
  - o Fall 2016 Full Time Post Secondary: 9,478
  - o Fall 2017 Full Time Post Secondary: 10,539
  - St. Clair College has exceeded 10,000 Full Time Post Secondary students.
  - o This represents an overall increase of 11.2%.

#### Data that is not included in the 10 Day Enrolment Report:

- English for Academic Purposes, a revised English program was introduced in Fall 2017. The projection was for enrolment of 100 students, a goal which was reached and is expected to increase in the future. This program allows an intake of students every seven weeks and is attractive to International students as it provides them with better pathways into full time post secondary education.
- Academic and Career Entrance (ACE) and Literacy and Basic Skills (LBS). These programs provide academic pathways for applicants who need to attain the admission requirements for their choice of post secondary program.

#### **Domestic Student Enrolment:**

- Budget: 7,800
- Strategic Direction Target: 7,800
- Actual Day 10 Enrolment: 7,975
- This represents a 2.2% increase.

#### International Student Enrolment:

- Budget: 720
- Strategic Direction Target: 3% increase over 2016
- Actual Day 10 Enrolment: 1,100
- This represents a 89% increase.

Mr. Silvaggi also provided an overview of the Day 10 Enrolment comparison by Campus and School of study. He summarized the Day 10 enrolment comparison by demographics. A breakdown of domestic versus international enrolment includes:

#### 7.2 Financial Quarterly Update

Mr. M. Jones reviewed the College financial results for the three months ended June 30, 2017. He highlighted the following financial information:

#### Total Net Surplus/(Deficit)

June	30,	2017	(\$5,279,587)
June	30,	2016	(\$6,666,086)

The variance is primarily due to the following:

- Higher Operating Grant revenue received from a one-time grant from MAESD in March 2017 of \$1,000,000.
- Increase of Acumen revenue of \$1,254,503 due to enrolment growth.
- Increases in non-salary expenditures of \$635,761 over the comparative period.

#### Revenue

The major changes in revenue compared to the original budget projections and the 2016 comparative financial period, include:

- Year-to-Date MAESD Operating Grants
  - o Increased over the 2016 comparative period primarily because of a one-time funding grant of \$1,000,000.

- Year-to-Date Contract Income is trending slightly below target due to timing associated with the flow of funding for the following programs:
  - Second Career
  - Pre-Apprenticeship Training
  - Canada Ontario Jobs Grant
  - Youth Job Connection
- Total Tuition revenue is significantly below target at 10.2% of the original budget projection but is \$551,691 higher than the 2016 comparative period primarily due to the following:
  - International tuition revenue is trending higher than budget but is subject to adjustments for withdrawals for student VISA and immigration denials.
  - Increase is offset by a decrease in Continuing Education revenue.
  - Domestic enrolment is projected to reach its target of 7,900 students.
- Total "Other" income is currently lower than the original budget projection due to the following:
  - Increase in Acumen revenue over the 2016 comparative period due to higher enrolments.
  - Decrease in International Project revenue over the 2016 comparative period due to the wind down of the Panama Project.
  - Increase in Divisional Income over the 2016 comparative period due to the acquisition of the Skilled Trades Regional Training Centre, which began operations in January 2017.

#### **Expenditures**

The major changes in expenditures compared to the original budget projections and the 2016 comparative financial period are highlighted below:

- Total Salaries and Benefits are on target with the original budget projection and have increased over the 2016 comparative period by \$364,999. The increase reflects the following:
  - Additional staffing due to the acquisition of the Skilled Trades Regional Training Centre operations.
  - Lower Full-Time Administrative salaries because of reorganization initiatives.

- Lower Part-Time Faculty costs due to the implementation of zero-based budgeting.
- Administration continues to closely monitor all part-time related salaries and benefits.
- Total Non-Salary expenditures are trending lower than the original budget projections, however many expenditures are cyclical and follow the timing associated with the academic year. Non-Salary expenditures have increased over the 2016 comparative period by \$635,761 as many of these expenditures are related to the Skilled Trades Regional Training Centre.
- Administration is managing non-salary expenditures in order to achieve the overall expenditure budget.

#### **Ancillary Operations**

Total Ancillary revenues and expenditures are trending lower than the original budget projections and are lower than the 2016 comparative period, primarily due to fact that the Thames Capitol Theatre was returned to the Municipality of Chatham-Kent effective June 30, 2016.

#### Financial Sustainability Metrics

- In 2017 we achieved zero flags.
- The 2018 metric estimates have been updated based upon the strong results that we have achieved through the last fiscal year; however, the College is still anticipating one flag.
- Five of the seven metrics are even stronger based on the data received in the March budget package.

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## Former Fire Chief recognized as Technologist of the Year

During a special function hosted at the Caboto Club last Friday afternoon, former Essex Fire Chief Ed Pillon, CET, received the Windsor-Essex County Technologist of the Year Award.

Every year, the Windsor-Essex County Engineering Month luncheon promotes engineering as a profession and highlights the improvement engineering makes to the general public

The local Engineering Month Committee selected Pillon as this years' recipient to recognize his lifetime of achievements in his career as a technologist and Fire Chief, but also for coaching minor sports, toy drives, volunteering as a firefighter, his involvement with Christmas and Goodfellows campaigns, and outreach for fire safety that he did as the Fire Chief.

"It was a surprise." Pillon commented after receiving the award. "I didn't expect it."

Pillon graduated from the Western Ontario Institute of Technology (W.O.I.T.) with a degree from the Mechanical Engineering program in 1967. He worked at General Chemical for 37 years, from 1967 to 2004. At that point, he took over as Fire Chief for the amalgamated Town of Essex. He spent 46 years in the firefighting industry, beginning in the former Township of Malden, along side his dad, who was a firefighter.

Pillon eyentually move and joined the fire service for Harrow Colchester South, where he became District Chief. Upon amalgamation in 1999, Pillon took on the role of District Chief for the Town of Essex before he became Fire Chief in 2004.

At General Chemical, Pillon began in the engineering department, but soon moved into the maintenance department where he progressed from a planner, to foreman, to supervisor, to general supervisor, and finally to operations supervisor of the entire plant

During his career at General Chemical, he enjoyed that the technological aspect was always a challenge in designing equipment to be more efficient. Part of his job included working with union and staff personnel. He was also involved in the hiring process and negotiations of union contracts.

His background in technology was helpful to his role with Essex Fire & Rescue as it related to building, designing, and construction of Fire Department-related assets, and overall safety of the fire personnel.

In his career with Essex Fire, Pillon noted some of his accomplishments included training, upgrading equipment, and the introduction of laptops in the fire vehicles, not to mention the building of the new fire station with ambulance bays. He complimented the Town and Councillors on overseeing the new fire station project.

"I owe a debt of thanks to all the great people I worked with over the years, and in particular my wife and family, who made many sacrifices over the years while I was serving the industry and the municipality," Pillon said.

At each luncheon, bursary awards are presented to students of St. Clair College and the University of Windsor, in addition to the Top 3 under 30, Engineer of the Year award, and Technologist of the Year award.

Pillon had a message to send to the aspiring engineers during the luncheon. "Never stop learning. In this modern day, things change so fast. You need to keep up."

Pillon retired as Fire Chief of Essex Fire & Rescue in 2014. He now enjoys his time traveling with his wife, playing hockey three times a week, and looks forward to the upcoming golf season. Most importantly, he said, he enjoys time spent with his family and grandkids.

Unifor 444 is partnering with St. Clair College to close a large gap in skilled trades. The union is donating \$75,000 toward the skilled trades and apprenticeship programs.

College President Patti France says the college is honoured to have the union's partnership and will call on its leadership to help with programs and projects. France says retiring baby boomers are leaving vacancies across all sectors and the Windsor area is no exception.

"There's an alarming generational skills gap in skilled trades and occupational fields involving science, technology, engineering and mathematics," says France.

France says enrolment in skilled trades is starting to increase.

The Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce estimates the local economy is losing \$600-million a year because of a lack of skilled trades workers.

France says the union's commitment to education is a commitment to our community's future well being, its economy, its young people, and its standard of living.

"The message that this dire shortfall equals a significant opportunity is at long last getting across to our young people. They know now that these openings constitute lucrative careers." France says.

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# Unifor Local 444 donates \$75,000 to St. Clair College to support trades

The dangers to the local economy of the growing skill trades shortage has become a familiar refrain, but Unifor Local 444 backed its concerns with cash Tuesday by donating \$75,000 to St. Clair College's technical programs.

The money will be spent on purchasing new equipment for the college's Ford Centre of Excellence and the new St. Clair College Skilled Trades Regional Training Centre.

"It wasn't just giving a donation and walking away," said Dino Chiodo, president of Local 444, "A partnership has developed.

"We want to be a player in making sure we're all focused on what's important to make sure we don't have that skills gap."

Chiodo said he only had to look at his own membership to see the looming crisis ahead

The baby boom generation is beginning to retire and take with it their acquired skills before the fiext generation is there to benefit from such knowledge.

"At the Windsor Assembly Plant you probably have 1,000 people out of 6,000 who are eligible to retire." Chiodo said. "How do you replace them"

"St. Clair has the means to do that, why wouldn't we take advantage of that knowing openings will be coming in the future for those specific jobs?"

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The donation is particularly timely with the college embarking on a plan to update its older equipment with modern machinery.

The college just recently purchase some five-axis CNC machines but the priority list remains lengthy.

"What it symbolizes is, not only the donation of \$75,000, but the collaboration and willingness of Unifor to participate in supporting all the skilled trades, engineering and apprenticeships," said Patti France, president of St. Clair College.

"No one can do it on their own, there's no magic bullet."

France said after several years of the various stakeholders pushing the trades as a viable career locally, the message finally seems to be resonating with students and their families.

France noted applications from women are also on the rise at the college.

"Applications are up in all our technical programs," said France, who said final enrolment numbers won't be available until August.

"Youth are realizing these are great jobs that will allow them to stay in the community and earn great money.

"They're getting hired before they even cross the graduation stage in June. We're getting calls for students and we don't have anybody to send."

Chiodo said Local 444 took a couple years to examine how it could best get involved.

He said the union felt the standards, equipment and technical teaching at the college was the best fit for Local 444's goals.

"We're saying we're looking at this wrong," Chiodo said noting increasing use of temporary foreign skilled trades workers.

"What we need to do is refocus ourselves with St. Clair College and with their direction to give people the technical component to learn these trades. The trades is a good way to have a good lifestyle in this community."

France said this is just the beginning of stronger relationship with Unifor.

"We've talked about collaborating in everything," France said.

"We've talked about training and credit recognition in being able to get people out in the workforce without duplication.

"An employer could get a skilled employee in a shorter duration and have less of an investment."

## Unifor continues to fight Windsor skills gap with \$75K donation to St. Clair College

St. Clair College to invest money into upgrading training facilities to better prepare students for jobs

In an ongoing bid to help manufacturers in the Windsor region find skilled workets, union leaders have invested \$75,000 to help upgrade trades programs at \$t\_i\$ Clair College.

#### Skilled trades shortage costing Windsor-Lssex \$600M every year, says report

Officials from Unifor Local 444 and the college announced a new partnership Tuesday morning, past weeks after business leaders sounded the alarm on a widening skills gap that is costing the region half a billion dollars a year.

"In our world, we have employers who can't find anybody to fill jobs," said Dino Chiodo, Local 444 president, "We want to be a part of the solution."

The money is just one component of an 18-month collaboration between the school and the union that has helped the college understand the needs of employers, said St. Clair College president Patti France.

Unifor has given the school input on how to improve programs, while acting as a liaison between the industry and the school, she said. The union's donation will now help upgrade equipment, so students have training on some of the latest technology needed to land jobs.

This deal "symbolizes the collaboration between St. Clair College and Unifor," France said. "We've been very fortunate to have Unifor at the table."

Skilled trades people have been a challenge to find, according to the latest report from the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce. Last year alone, half of the employers in the area had difficulty hiring people with skills ranging from builders to forklift operators with between 400-500 jobs unfilled.

France commended several groups, including the region's school boards, governments and posts secondary institutions, for working together to tackle the skills gap.

"There's no magic bullet. We all have to work together and collaborate," France said. "Unifor is part of that collaboration and that effort."

The Windsor/Essex County Sports Hall of Fame will grow with the addition of five athletes and three builders that were unveiled on Wednesday as the 2017 induction class.

Anne (Botica) Grover (volleyball), Brittany Hedderson (basketball), Jerry Kauric (football), Todd Nadon (boxing, and Joanne Rothery (track and field) will enter in the athletes category.

Alice Bell (curling), Pete Cusumano (basketball) and the late Bob Weepers (basketball and administration) will go on the builders side.

The hall will also honour Riverside Bantam-Midget Hockey Tournament and the Windsor AKO junior men's basketball team (1947-1979).

"Every year, you find these unique individuals that represented our community at the local, provincial, national and international level," said Dr. Scott Martyn, who is chair of the hall. "It's amazing, all of these individual and the accomplishments they've had, they're truly humbled.

"That humility is indicative of the individual. Being recognized by the local community still means so much to them."

From 1994-98, Grover was a dominant force for St. Joseph high school and was a four-time league all-star. She spent four years with Team Ontario while serving as captain her final season and played in the 1997 Canada Games.

She accepted a full-ride scholarship to Ohio State University in 2000 and ended her career 10th in school history in kills, 12th in aces and 17th in hitting.

"It was a bit of a shock because I had no idea this was coming," Grover said of her selection. "Really quite excited and proud. I don't expect this, but it definitely makes me feel very proud."

Hedderson was a standout guard at St. Anne high school from 2004 to 2008. The five-foot-nine guard captained the team to the 2007 OFSAA girls' AAAA championship and she still holds the school record for points in a game with 39.

She spent three seasons with the provincial team and was an all-Canadian selection in 2008 while being named Miss Basketball In Ontario and became just the sixth area female athlete to win the Royal Arcanum twice as the area's top high school student-athlete.

She accepted a scholarship to the University of Buffalo and finished her collegiate career as one of only two players in school history to record 1,400 points and 300 assists.

"Sometimes you forget that the reasons why we have those big achievements is because of where you're from," Hedderson said. "Windsor has really helped me to be the person that I am. I had some great coaches and teammates to push me to chase my dreams."

A Kennedy high school product, , Kauric, who was not at Wednesday's announcement, was a standout kicker for the Windsor AKO Fratmen before signing with the Edmonton Eskimos in the Canadian Football league.

In his first CFL season, Kauric kicked the game-winning field goal to win the 1987 Grey Cup. In 1990, he earned the kicking job for the NFL's Cleveland Browns before returning to the CFL to wrap us his career with the Calgary Stampeders.

Born in Edmonton, Nadon moved to Windsor at the age of eight. He was the first Canadian to join the famous Kronk Boxing Gym and sparred with world champion Tommy Hearns while working under the guidance of Emmanuel Stewart.

Nadon, who was not at Wednesday's announcement, won five U.S. Golden Glove titles and was selected to compete at the 1988 Olympics, but was unable to participate due to injury.

A southpaw, Nadon is the only Canadian to hold the International Boxing Organization's World Super Middleweight title. He scored a TKO over Willie Ball in the 12<sup>th</sup> round to win the crown in 1992. He finished his professional career with a 14-5-1 record and six knockouts.

Rothery was dominant in the shot put circle right from the start at Kennedy Collegiate high school. She established a midget girls record for Ontario with a throw of 12.25 metres and it stood for more than two decades.

She accepted a scholarship to Oklahoma State University and set meet marks in shot put and discus while lettering in 1985 and 1986. She returned to Canada and was a two-time All-Canadian selection at the University of Saskatchewan.

"Just he people I've met," said Rothery, who remains active in the sport. "The friendships I've kept. Track and field is such an individual sport. On the competitive field, you're always the ultimate athlete, but off the field you're always friends."

On the builders side, Bell began curling in 1962 and eventually became a district representative for the Southern Ontario Ladies Curling Association in 1983.

She won numerous awards competing, but also served as a course conductor and was recognized by the Ontario Curling Association with a lifetime achievement award.

She became involved in Curl Canada's Certification program while continuing to coach. She guided Pam Leavitt's team to the Scotties Tournament of Hearts and St. Clair College to the zone and regional wins.

"It's phenomenal," Bell said. "It is work, but it's work I really like doing.

"The sport is now one of the major sports. That's a real plus and I think a lot of people are happy to see that."

Cusumano, who is affectionately known as Coach Cooz, started coaching in 1980 at Brennan high school before moving over to Catholic Central in 1985.

While finding success in baseball, cross-country and track and field, it was basketball where Cusumano made his biggest impact where his boys' teams won seven OFSAA medals. As well as coaching, he founded Core City Hoops while serving as a WECSSAA convenor on several occasions.

"It's a great honour," Cusumano said. "I look at some of my friends who are here as builders: Jack Costello, (Paul) Doc Thomas, Bob Weepers. These are guys I've known for years and I admired and respected them. Now, to be able to join them, is a great honour."

Weepers, who passed away in 2010, played on numerous basketball teams in his playing days, but served as the intercollegiate Athletic Co-ordinator at St. Clair College for 31 years. During that time, he guided the women's basketball team to four medals at the provincial level.

He served on the Windsor/Essex County Sports Hall of Fame board of directors for several years and was one of the region's foremost sports historians.

# Transit Windsor hit by perfect storm of good news, including higher ridership

Transit Windsor has been hit by a perfect storm of good news, crediting a jump in ridership to a number of recent and ongoing improvements and expansion to the city's public transportation system.

Ridership is suddenly up and expected to rise further in the near future. Executive director Pat Delmore cites a number of developments for the bright outlook:

- \$20 million in new federal/city funding to pay for 24 new buses and 150 new solar-powered bus shelters, with the second phase of funding still to come.
- New technology helping the system operate better and inform riders exactly when their bus is due.
- A partnership with LaSalle to provide a route through the town that connects with the Windsor system starting in September.
- The resounding success of the U-Pass program approved last year in a referendum by University of Windsor graduate and undergrad students who pay an extra \$66 per semester for a universal bus pass. With 12,500 U-Passes in circulation during the winter semester, students are filling the buses, not just to go to school, but to travel throughout the city day and night.

Ridership, which had been stagnant in recent years, is up 3.5 per cent, manks to U-rass, equating to 227,000 more bus rides a year. And now part-time students have voted to join the U-Pass program starting in the fall.

"The uptake has been very, very impressive," said Coun. Bill Marra, who chairs the Transit Windsor board and is hopeful of getting St. Clair students on board with a U-Pass program as well. "Getting more students on the buses and exposed to public transit has been very, very valuable," he said.

All these new initiatives are aimed at increasing ridership, Delmore said. And when that happens, revenue climbs and improvements to the system are possible, which again leads to increased ridership, revenues and more improvements, he added.

The U-Pass program was supposed to be revenue neutral, meaning the money lost from \$66-per-month bus passes that some students bought was offset by getting \$66 per semester from everyone. But the program has generated more revenue than expected because fewer students than predicted opted out (they can opt out if they live in the county), enrolment was higher than expected and the increased ridership has resulted in more cash from the province's gas tax. That extra money will be ploughed back into improving service to the students, Delmore said.

"This builds a community, it really does, because it gives you the additional dollars into the system to help you to build it, and then other people are attracted to the service," Delmore said of the U-Pass program.

He said if St. Clair students agree to a similar deal, service would first have to be improved on the routes that service the college's main campus. And that would improve service for everyone in South Windsor.

"If we had every-15-minute or every-10-minute service on the Dominion 5 (one of two routes that service St. Clair), how many people might say: 'You know what? I don't necessarily need a second car or a third car," Delmore said. "That's the whole goal of what a student bus pass can do for a community."

University of Windsor Students' Alliance vice-president Sarah Noureddine said the program has definitely been a success. Students are riding the bus more frequently and enjoying the value, she said. "Sixty-six dollars a semester is much more doable than the current monthly fee for a transit pass," she said, adding she expects even more students will use the U-Pass when the part-time students start using i and the LaSalle service starts in September.

Though LaSalle gets the ridership revenue when someone gets on the bus in LaSalle, Transit Windsor gets the money when that rider boards in Windsor to go back to LaSalle. Delmore and Marra both hope the LaSalle service will be such a success that other neighbouring municipalities — including Tecumseh which has its own bus service that doesn't integrate with Transit Windsor — will be interested in a similar arrangement.

The result, said Delmore, could be a truly integrated regional transit system.

### Officials reject blogger's claim St. Clair College was terror target

A right-wing blogger's claim that St. Clair College was being targeted for a terrorist attack which caused an online stir on social media—is bogus, according to college officials.

"I can tell you that the event back in April was fully investigated by all levels of law enforcement and there was never a threat to St. Clair College staff or students." said Ann Hetherington, the college's director of marketing and recruitment.

Blogger Kevin J. Johnston posted a video rant containing unsubstantiated claims that two "Muslim psychopaths" had their plans to execute an attack at the college thwarted thanks to a head-on traffic collision.

Hetherington said St. Clair first contacted police following the crash in April, after the Windsor Star asked college officials about the rumours. She said police told them there was no threat.

The video commentary is on the website FreedomReport.ca, along with such videos as "White Woman Wants A White Doctor She Gets Attacked By Racists For It." and "How Menstrual Blood Blocks Prayers to Allah." Johnston has focused on Windsor before, with a post about Islamic services being held in a Walkerville home.

Representatives of West Region OPP and Essex County OPP did not respond to requests for comment.

The two-car crash, between a Lexus and a Volkswagen, happened April 26 on Highway 3.

Something about the crash did seem unusual. A few officers stood watch with rifles while others investigated. Officers also meticulously searched the Lexus. Investigators even brought in a police dog to sniff through the vehicle.

Two people were riding in each car. They were all seriously hurt. Two of those injured people, Tariq Elamin, 27, and Satvir Singh, 21, were arrested immediately. The following day, they were arraigned on a long list of firearm and ammunition charges while still admitted and being treated at Windsor Regional Hospital.

Singh's lawyer, Maria Carroccia, watched Johnston's video Friday. She said it is fraught with lies.

"It's entirely fabricated," she said. "This is obviously racist.

"There is absolutely no evidence that these two men are affiliated with any Muslim group and, in fact, I don't think my client is even Muslim."

Carroccia said the vehicle carrying the two men was headed in the opposite direction of St. Clair College. The crash occurred in Oldcastle, "nowhere near St. Clair College," she said.

Johnston says Elamin and Singh were "driving like a couple of freaking maniacs" and caused the crash, injuring a "white Canadian couple."

Carroccia said he has that wrong, too. "My understanding is the driver of the other vehicle may have suffered some medical emergency, crossed the centreline and that resulted in the accident."

Essex County OPP have yet to publicly confirm the cause of the crash. They have also never responded to Windsor Star questions about the rumours of alleged attack plans.

But on Tuesday, Johnston, who calls himself an author, editor, journalist and social commentator, posted an inflammatory video on his website claiming the two men charged were intent on murdering people at the college.

The video title page has a picture of a gun and blood splatter with the caption "St. Clair College was almost a blood bath."

He accuses police, the Windsor Star and other media of covering up the thwarted terror attack for unexplained reasons. He said no "real news outlet" would report it.

Johnston continued his tirade Friday in a phone interview with the Windsor Star. He would not concede that the information in his video might be incorrect, saying, "I do this for my country."

Yelling into the telephone for most of the interview, he said he would not divulge his sources, but insisted his information came from "city staff."

In his video, he claims that the men told paramedics at the scene of the crash "that they were on their way to St. Clair College to shoot the place up."

Deputy Chief Justin Lammers with Essex-Windsor EMS said Friday he couldn't comment because it's still an "active investigation."

ITEM 4.0 Page 24 of 150 Carroccia called Johnston's video defamatory to her client. "He's using names and saying things that aren't true."

The video, in which Johnston calls for "Islam to be banned worldwide," is also full of unsubstantiated claims unrelated to the crash.

One of them is that Muslims from Dearborn, Mich., are "infiltrating and destroying – utterly destroying – the City of Windsor."

"It's a dangerous place to be," Johnston claims in his rant. "People in Windsor are terrified to go downtown Windsor at night. They're terrified to go into the southeast section of the city at night. People are disgusted by the fact that that when you drive through most areas in Windsor now, that signs are not even in English. They are in Arabic."

In the last few days, the video about the Highway 3 crash has gained a lot of traction on social media, with people sharing it repeatedly. The Star has also received numerous emails and phone calls from concerned citizens.

Despite the public silence from provincial police on the issue, Hetherington said they assured the college there was no threat.

"They indicated to us back in April that there was never a threat to the staff or the college or students at the college — never," said Hetherington.

Carroccia said there is good reason for the police to keep information under wraps while a case is before the courts.

"In Canada, we protect people's right to have a fair trial. This is not like the U.S. We don't try people in the media. We try them in the courts."



Cunningham's brother Eric Cunningham just graduated after three seasons with the Saints and he knows the program well.



"I just feel confident playing with him. He brought me to this pathway and I trust him and I think we're going to have a good year."





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# Hearing on Ontario minimum-wage increase coming to Windsor

The proposal to raise Ontario's minimum wage to \$15 per hour is open for discussion, with public hearings in cities throughout the province over the next two weeks—including Windsor on Friday.

It's the public consultation phase of Bill 148, the <u>Fair Workplaces</u>, <u>Better Jobs Act</u>— a pack of labour legislation reforms that would controversially boost the minimum hourly wage to \$14 by Jan. 1, 2018, and to \$15 by 2019.

Ontario's minimum wage is currently \$11.40 per hour, and is set to rise to \$11.60 per hour in October due to inflation. The proposed jump to \$15 per hour has been touted by the government as the biggest increase to minimum wage in Ontario history.

<u>Premier Kathleen Wynne formally announced the idea on May 31</u>, and now the Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs has scheduled a series of meetings to hear comment from the public.

Windsor's hearing will take place downtown at the St. Clair College Centre for the Arts (201 Riverside Dr. West) for eight hours on Friday, from 9:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.

Anyone can attend the meetings as an observer. To attend as a speaking delegate required signing up in advance.

There are currently 19 approved delegations for the Windsor meeting, including representatives of Unifor Locals 240 and 444, CUPE Local 543, the Windsor University Faculty Association, the WindsorEssex Economic Development Corporation, and small businesses such as Sunrise Farms and Antonino's Original Pizza.

Each delegation will have 20 minutes to speak to the committee.

Among the delegates: Matt Marchand of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce, who has stated opposition to the \$15 minimum wage.

The regional chamber of commerce is backing the Keep Ontario Working coalition — describing the proposed increase as "arbitrary" and "lost much, too fast."

"Ontario's employer community is concerned that the pace of change will seriously injure our economic growth." the coalition said in a release.

Along with hiking minimum wage, Bill 148's reforms will also affect pay equality among parttime workers, increase vacation time entitlements, and expand the terms of emergency personal leave.

The <u>Keep Ontario Working</u> coalition includes a wide range of business groups and associations, including Food and Beverage Ontario. Restaurants Canada, the Retail Council of Canada, the Ontario Real Estate Association, the Tourism Industry Association of Ontario, and many more.

But Tim Deelstra, who will speak in Windsor on Friday for United Food & Commercial Workers Local 633, believes that significant improvement to minimum wage in Ontario have been a long time coming.

"Our position as a union is that the increase has been long needed." Deelstra said. "We had, for the life of the Conservative government in Ontario, almost nine years of no minimum wage increase, while costs continued to go up for workers."

"I understand that from (the business sector) perspective, this is a big increase very quickly. But it is needed by many workers in the province."

UFCW Local 633 members in Windsor-Essex include meat handlers at Metro, Food Basics, and Real Canadian Superstore locations.

The public input sessions began in Thunder Bay on Monday and will also happen this week in North Bay, Ottawa, and Kingston.

Next week's hearings are scheduled to take place in London, Kitchener-Waterloo, Niagara Falls, Hamilton, and Toronto.

Ontario's <u>Standing Committee on Finance and Leonomic Affairs</u> will hear public input on <u>Bill 148</u> on Friday starting at 9:30 a.m. at the International Room of the St. Clair College Centre for the Arts, 201 Riverside Dr. West.

The hearings will also be streamed live on the Legislative Assembly of Ontario website, www.ontla.on.ca.



### Minimum wage debate reaches Windsor

A legislative committee hears testimony from all sides concerning Ontario's proposed \$15-an-hour minimum wage hike.

A proposed minimum wage increase has brought out strong opinions on both sides in Windsor-Essex.

The Ontario legislature's Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs held an all-day public hearing Friday at the St. Clair College Centre for the Arts in downtown Windsor. The hearing was well-attended throughout the day by people in favour of Bill 148 as well as those either opposed to it or suggesting amendments to it.

Bill 148 is known as the Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act of 2017. It would serve as an amendment to the Employment Standards Act of 2000 and the Labour Relations Act of 1995. If approved by the legislature and signed into law by Premier Kathleen Wynne, the law would change scheduling provisions as well as amend the formulas for calculating overtime pay and public holiday work.

The law would also allow more emergency time for employees and mandate equal pay for parttime, casual and seasonal employees, along with those working through temp agencies.

The key component to Bill 148 however, is a plan to increase the minimum wage in Ontario to \$14 per hour in January 2018, then to \$15 per hour in January 2019. The current rate is \$11.40 per hour.

Local labour unions are overwhelmingly in favour of the proposed increase, saying it will raise the standard-of-living, improve morale and stimulate competition. Some businesses and business groups oppose it, claiming it would increase costs and result in less people being hired.

One person who believes Bill 148 should be tweaked is Matt Marchand, president of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce. Testifying before the standing committee, he said rising labour and hydro costs are not making investment in Ontario attractive.

"Flectricity costs are up 400 per cent, carbon tax for cap and trade are costing billions of dollars, punishing businesses and our middle class for using Ontario's clean grid," said Marchand.

Marchand suggests Bill 148 include a longer time frame to ease into the minimum wage increase, to allow businesses an easier adjustment period, rather than the two-step, \$3.60 per hour increase currently being considered. He also recommends offsetting costs, keeping a closer eye on emergency leave, and suggesting exemptions for the agriculture and auto industries in relation to a proposed 48-hour scheduling requirement.

Marchand also suggests increasing skill levels for Windsor-Essex's current labour force to do specialized jobs currently in demand.

Two southwestern Ontario opposition members of the legislature were on hand with the standing committee to hear testimony and ask questions. These were Progressive Conservative MPP Rick Nicholls of Chatham-Kent-Essex and New Democrat MPP Percy Hatfield of Windsor-Tecumseh.

The standing committee is chaired by Liberal MPP Peter Milezyn of Etobicoke-Lakeshore.

# Chamber Calls For Changes To Minimum Wage Bill

The head of the local chamber of commerce is suggesting amendments to a proposed change in Ontario's minimum wage.

Matt Marchand, president of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce, testified before an Ontario legislative committee Friday as part of a day-long public hearing at the St. Clair College Centre for the Arts in Windsor. Representatives from area businesses, as well as local unions and the general public, were invited to provide their take on Bill 148, the key provision of which would raise Ontario's minimum wage.

Marchand, who is not opposed to the minimum wage increase, would like to see it eased in, rather than the proposed jump to \$14/hr in January 2018 and \$15/hr in January 2019. The current minimum wage in Ontario, according to the province, is \$11.40/hr for general labour.

"Do a five-year phase-in for minimum wage to help small business and agriculture like they do in California," says Marchand.

Other amendments suggested by Marchand include offsetting costs and clamping down on the rules concerning emergency leave days.

The \$15thr minimum wage proposal is the centrepiece of Bill 148, which if approved, would be an amendment of the Employment Standards Act, 2000 as well as the Labour Standards Act, 1995. Other provisions include adjusting scheduling guidelines to require businesses to pay an employee three hours worth of salary even if the employee works less than three hours in a shift, and minimum pay for being on-call. Employers will also be required to pay three hours' worth to an employee whose scheduled shift is cancelled within 48 hours of the shift's start.

TEM 4.0 Page 43 of 150 Marchand suggests exemptions to that rule in the auto industry as well as in Essex County's strong agricultural sector.

"Some companies in the auto sector often experience brief power outages of seconds or minutes that requires many hours to reset for production," says Marchand, "If it happens on a Thursday or Friday, they can't reschedule for Saturday due to the 48-hour rule."

Other changes in the proposed bill include amending the requirements for paid holidays, and requiring employees to offer a minimum of three weeks' paid vacation for full-time employees with at least five years of service.

Marchand believes that wages and scheduling aside, it would be more important to make Ontario more conductive to business growth with more skilled workers to fill specialized, high-paying positions, which some Windsor-Essex manufacturers are having trouble filling.

"He want to get wages up, the best way to do that is to skill our people up," says Marchand, "The government should be joining us in focusing on getting Ontarians skills with the jobs that are in demand, Jobs that pay \$20, \$30 or more per hour."

Members of the legislature's Standing Committee on Finance and Economic Affairs heard testimony Friday. With the Liberal government, the majority of regular members were Liberal MPPs, with the others in the opposition parties.

Chatham-Kent-Essex MPP Rick Nicholls, a Tory, and Windsor-Tecumseh MPP Percy Hatfield of the NDP sat in with the committee members. Nicholls pointed out the rising costs of labour in Ontario that Marchand referred to in his remarks. Hatfield, on the other hand, asked Marchand for examples of cost offsetting. Marchand replied that the chamber is putting together an economic impact analysis which would be presented within a few weeks.

The standing committee heard Friday from labour unions, who are in favour of a minimum wage hike, and local businesses who oppose it and are worried about increased costs.

Kareem is one of about 750 Windsor-Essex students that participated in the third annual Windsor Jumpstart Games sponsored by Canadian Tire.



"In terms of people losing their jobs, it is painful whenever someone loses their job in this province," says Wynne. "We are working very hard with organized labour, with communities, with the private sector to bring more jobs to the province, to grow the jobs in the province and in fact—Ontario's economy is growing, but not everybody is sharing equally in that; I get that."

Wynne is expected in Windsor on Friday at 9am for event at the University of Windsor which is followed by a roundtable discussion on labour at St. Clair College at 9:50am before heading to a meeting with Windsor Mayor Drew Dilkens at city hall set for 11:45am.

The President and CEO of the Windsor-Essex Regional Chamber of Commerce told Kathleen Wynne that the region has lost out on hundreds of high-paying jobs because the province is 'just not competitive'.

"I reminded the Premier this morning, that we had an agreement, years ago, on minimum wage," said Matt Marchand. Bill 148 however calls for minimum wage to go up to \$14 on January 1, 2018 and reach \$15 an hour in 2019.

Marchand was one of 10 Windsorites invited to a private meeting with the head of Ontario's government Friday. Marchand said he used his three minutes to tell her the reality of Ontario's competitiveness, or lack thereof.

"Recently a large employer in this region, was unable to bring in up to 700 well-paying, \$50,000 to \$70,000 jobs, here in the Windsor-Essex area," claimed Marchand.

The Chamber leader blames soaring electricity costs, cap and trade, and now Bill 148 are making Ontario less attractive.


The Premier concedes the bill will be difficult for small business, but she says it will include help for them.

# Wynne hints at relief for restaurateurs worried about hike to minimum wage

Restaurant owners are anxious about looming changes to Ontario's labour laws; the minimum wage is set to increase to \$15 an hour by 2019



Ontario Premier Kathleen Wynne is promising help for restaurant owners as he province prepares to increase the minimum wage. Restaurants Canada, which represents 30,000 businesses across the country, said the industry is watching Wynne's moves closely.

Premier Kathleen Wynne is hinting at something appetizing for restaurateurs anxious about looming changes to Ontario's labour laws.

With the government <u>raising</u> the \$11.40-an-hour minimum wage to \$14 on Jan. 1, and \$15 in 2019, and improving employees' rights on scheduling. Wynne has been <u>trying</u> to allay the fears of restaurant operators.

"We want to be fair to businesses and, as well, to employees," the premier said Friday at St. Clair College in Windsor

"Restaurant owners, in particular, have talked to me about other fees that they pay —, other things that come off their off their payroll cheques; some of the fees that they pay to some of the —, you know, to the I CBO, for example," said Wynne, referring to the province's liquor monopoly.

"We don't know exactly what those will be, but there are a number of suggestions that are coming forward. We're looking at everything, because, as I say, I want us to find this balance."

ITEM 4.0 Page 60 of 150 As part of the proposed wage <u>changes</u>, liquor servers, who make most of their money from tips, will see their minimum hourly wage jump from \$9.90 now to \$12.20 on Jan. 1, and \$13.05, the year after that.

James Rilett, a vice-president of Restaurants Canada, which represents 30,000 businesses across the country, said the industry is watching Wynne's moves closely.

Rilett, who is meeting with Small Business Minister Jeff Leal next week and will be talking soon with Finance Minister Charles Sousa, said there is much the government can do to offset the impact of the reforms on business.

"I think they're realizing that the economics of this aren't as straightforward as they one thought."

Asked if he is sensing flexibility on the part of the Liberal government, he said: "I hope so. I still don't know."

"I'll give them the benefit of the doubt. I hope they intended to give us some assistance, and we'll continue to work with them and see how it pans out," he said.

Last week, Restaurants Canada released a survey of its members that found 95 per cent of restaurateurs believe the wage hike will hurt them. The poll found 98 per cent will raise menu prices; 97 per cent will reduce labour hours; 81 per cent will lay off staff; 74 per cent will embrace more automation, and 26 per cent would close one or more locations.

The restaurant industry is a major part of Ontario's economy; it generates \$32 billion a year and employs more than 470,000 people in the province.

Rilett noted some restaurateurs are already slowly raising prices to lessen the chance of sticker shock for consumers in next year.

Wynne said she appreciates the concerns of business, but stressed that people "can't live on \$11.40 an hour" and they deserve a raise.

"By increasing the minimum wage, we're actually creating a situation where businesses, I suggest, will be able to retain their workers because the playing field will be more level," the premier said, conceding she is trying to strike a delicate balance.

"We have to be careful that we don't come up with unintended consequences."

### Ontarians fear job skills outdated, survey finds

Chamber of Commerce warns of mismatch between what employers need and what workers trained for

Ontarians are increasingly worried their job skills will be outdated in the changing economy, says a new report from the chamber of commerce that warns of a mismatch between what workers are trained for and what employers need.

"For many businesses—82 per cent can't find (workers) with proper qualifications," said Richard Koroscil, interim president of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce.

"We are seeing this big skills mismatch. And we are also hearing, not just from employers, but a recent poll of the general population found that half of Ontarians feel their skills will have less value in the next decade. Unless this is fixed, it is going to have a significant impact on the future growth of Ontario, especially as we move into a knowledge-based economy."

Koroscil said the skilled trades are in demand, but it's tough to fill jobs. Businesses would like to see that system modernized—with more flexible journeyperson-to-apprentice ratios—as well as fewer barriers to get into programs. Trades also need to be better promoted as potential careers

"These are good jobs," he added "These are good jobs that pay very good salaries."

Ontario's education ministry continues to boost funding for "high skills major" programs in secondary schools, giving students a chance to earn real-world experiences in specialized areas. What's needed, says the College Student Alliance, is better promotion of the skilled trades to teens.

"The conversation should start in high school — or earlier — so students can understand and know what their options are other than university," said president Joel Willett.

The alliance would like to see the government create a website for youth that provides labour market information, such as where jobs are, what jobs are available, what skills are needed and what skills colleges provide.

"We have strongly supported in the past the career pathways in the skilled trades, and we have advocated for stronger supports for college students for quite (a long) time now," he said.

Deb Matthews, minister of advanced education and skills development, said "Ontario's employment and training programs are helping Ontarians skill up for the jobs of the future. The economy is changing and our government is determined to see that no one is left behind. To do this, we need to ensure that people in Ontario of all ages and at all stages of their lives are able to easily access high-quality training that will prepare them for the jobs of today and tomorrow."

She said from apprenticeships to skills upgrading "or working more closely with employers and educators to better match students with new jobs, we will make sure Ontarians are ready."

Matthews also noted that for the first time, mature students are eligible for student assistance under OSAP, to return to school or improve their skills.

Koroscil said artificial intelligence will have a huge impact on the workplace, "and we need to be preparing for that."

"We need to be anticipating what is going to be coming, instead of reacting," he added.

On Friday at St. Clair College, Premier Kathleen Wynne said the province will "continue to lead in terms of our highly skilled workforce, in terms of our innovation. I think the mayor was talking today here in Windsor about artificial intelligence. You know, the investments that we are making and the support that we are giving to the innovative sector here in Ontario, that's where the future lies."

"And I don't have enough of a crystal ball to be able to say where we're going to be in 20 years. But, what we want to do is make sure that we're graduating young people who are going to be able to take us to that to that new vision."

A new mobile training unit could be on the way for Windsor-Essex firefighters.

The Mobile Live Fire Training Unit would be split between Windsor and fire departments in Amberstburg. LaSaffe and the St. Clair College training program at a shared cost of \$380,000.

Windsor Fire and Rescuc Chief Steve Laforet says the training unit was brought up in a report as a goal recently.

"It's an opportunity to have some greater efficiencies in the county. 
The opportunity to purchase a refurbished unit from Draeger Canada presented itself, and Laforet says the price is right.

#### Plans Continue For Transit Service In LaSalle

On Tuesday evening LaSalle Town Council will be asked to spend some money on the necessary infrastructure to support the new town bus routes.

# LaSalle to roll out transit plan with initial \$164,000 investment

LaSalle has already partnered with Transit Windsor to buy two buses that will travel from St. Clair College through the town's main business district, to the Vollmer Centre and Front Road, eventually connecting to Windsor's system

The entire route will take about 45 minutes. The service will start at the beginning of September, just in time to provide students with a new transportation option

To help introduce the service to the community, the town will let people ride for free for the first four months.


"Together, our better plan will provide students with the quality education that they deserve and that will benefit their future employers, and our province as a whole."



Windsor, St. Clair College, LaSalle and Amherstburg are chipping in to buy a fire-training simulator that provides "the best opportunity we have to actually train with fire," according to Windsor Fire Chief Stephen Laforet.

City council recently approved the purchase of the \$386,383 refurbished simulator, which would cost more than \$600,000 new. The cost-sharing arrangement has the largest fire department, Windsor, paying two-fifths of the cost, with the other groups each paying onefifth. St. Clair College would use it for its firefighter training program.

"It's a really expensive piece of equipment that, on our own, we really couldn't afford at this time," Laforet said. The simulator from Draeger Canada is on a semi trailer that can be hauled to one location, opened up and extended upwards to create a fire-training apparatus, then taken down and moved to the next location.

"We'll have it each year for more than enough time to get everyone through," the chief said, explaining it will be erected at the department's emergency apparatus and equipment repair and maintenance facility on Kew Drive.

ITEM 4.0 Page 16 of 150 The fireproof simulator comes with rooms, doors, stairs and other features, along with propane burners inside that create realistic fire scenarios that firefighters attack as a team. In the distant past, Laforet said, fire departments would try to get possession of a vacant house to set on fire, so firefighters could train with real fire.

"But that's a very, very dangerous thing to do, not to mention all the pollution it creates and all those types of things."

The city also has a concrete training structure at its College Avenue station, but it provided a very limited opportunity for realistic training, he said.

The closest simulators are in Sarnia or in Oakland, Mich., which is where new recruits are sent for training before becoming full-fledged firefighters. But sending firefighters away was too expensive because of the cost for replacing them on their shifts, the chief said.

Most in-service training is currently done in components, such as ladder work and water pumping. Laforet said the simulator "allows us to bring together the entire picture of a fire scene," including ladder training, search and rescue, pumper operations, hose line placement and incident command.

"So right from the first arriving officer, making appropriate decisions and deploying his crew, to expanding it to include other units and someone being in command."

The simulator will ensure all firefighters are better trained in live fire extinguishment, a report to council says.

Laforet said it's not too late for fire departments from other municipalities to get involved in the cost sharing.

Windsor's \$154,553 cost will be paid with \$23,951 from a reserve account and \$130,602 from what remains in an account set up with \$255,000 about 13 years ago for a future training facility. The land was purchased on Sandwich Street, but the training facility was never built. A future report is going to address what to do with the vacant land.

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## University graduate back at college to meet labour market demands

When Simon Lizotte graduated from the University of Windsor with a degree in Sociology and Labour Studies, he expected take the world by storm.

But, Lizotte, 27, like many other students, found himself hitting a dead end and unable to find a job. Frustrated, he started researching jobs and was drawn to software development and mobile applications in particular.

"I did some research and found in a few years it will be a peak year for jobs in this field, so I figured why not go back to school and work toward that?." said I izotte, of Windsor.

Lizotte enrolled in the Mobile Applications Development program at St. Clair College. Peter Nikita, coordinator of the program, said the program has doubled in size since it was launched two years ago. There is a constant wait list of students who want to get into the program. Nikita initially designed the program after local industry leaders approached the school for graduating students in that field.

"They said we are hiring some of your web developers but we need app developers too," he said. "So it really was industry and a strong demand that developed this program."

The three-year advanced diploma program is designed for those interested in developing mobile applications for smartphones, tablets and the web. Students go through three streams Android, iOS (Apple) and Web App development. They learn to use a variety of languages and technologies to develop, build and deploy apps for the marketplace.

Workforce WindsorEssex released its list of top 75 in-demand jobs in this region last month with software developers making the cut. Spokesman Justin Falconer said the list was comprised from a variety of research methods including online job postings, employer surveys and consultations and news stories about companies expanding. The list is extensive and includes everything from senior managers in trade, broadcasting and retail to pharmacists, biologists and tool and die makers.

"We are seeing more and more job postings in this area," he said, "Job postings are already up 10 per cent from last year."

Jason Carruthers, owner of Zipp Lash and Mad Wax, has been struggling to find people for his lash extension and waxing businesses. Since opening the doors to Zipp Lash ten years ago, Carruthers, 48, has watched his business steadily grow. He's got investors eager to become a part of the growing business but he's facing a bigger challenge.

"What is our biggest problem?" he said "It's not customers or sales, it's the staft. Business is booming and we are pushing people away in a sense. We can't seem to get enough employees."

A shortage of skilled workers isn't limited anymore to technical trades in the manufacturing sector. Employers are seeing it everywhere

"There's not enough people out there," he said. "But why isn't there? We are offering a great job and a great career."

In 2016, the Global Wellness Institute (GW1), an international think tank focused on wellness, pointed out that the spa business is a growing, high-demand sector with recruitment and talent being their No. 1 challenge. According to statistics, the global spa market grew from \$94 billion in 2013 to \$98.6 billion in 2015. Research shows that the global spa industry will need 500,000 new spa therapists by 2018.

Lalconer can't offer a definitive answer to why there is such a shortage of talent in this area. He said the employment world is changing quickly with many new jobs and careers popping up constantly. Workforce WindsorEssex is currently putting together an online resource tool. Training and Careers Pathway, which will list the top 75 in-demand jobs along with links to the wages, skill set and education pathways. The resource tool is expected to be ready in Fall.

"There are a lot of careers that just didn't exist a number of years ago." he said, "We are hoping our new online tool will help get word out that these jobs are available and let them know they are in demand."

Katic Renaud, Researcher Quantitative I MI specialist at Workforce Windsor Essex has been doing quarterly surveys with employers since last May asking them what positions they have been hiring and which ones are hard to fill. The list highlights welders, machinists, computer programmers and construction labourers as jobs that employers are having a hard time filling

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"I think it's a combination of not enough applicants, people are not going into those positions or they just might not be aware that they are in demand," she said. "They may not be taking the right programs or they are just simply lacking the technical or soft skills needed."

For Lizotte, he couldn't be happier being back at school and working his way toward not only something he loves, but something which has a future.

He entered the Hacking Health in Detroit last year and designed an app with two other friends. They ended up winning \$6,000 and got some well-deserved recognition.

"I love it," he said. "My LinkedIn has been blowing up with people offering me jobs all the time and people just generally are always asking me about creating mobile apps. My university experience and prior work experience just didn't really seem to look into the future. But I see the horizon with this."



#### Leamington-area native wins prestigious Young Architect Award 'that we always strived for'

Learnington-area native Jodi Batay-Csorba and her husband Andrew always wanted to open an architecture practice together, and after the 2008 recession, they took that leap of faith.

Since founding Batay-Csorba Architects seven years ago, they have managed more than 96 projects in 38 different cities across 11 countries. Earlier this year, they received the 2017 Royal Architectural Institute of Canada Young Architect Award for their work.

"It's an award that we always strived for," Jodi Batay-Csorba said.

An architect in Canada under the age of 40 is selected for the award annually "but in our case, they actually selected both Andrew and myself," she said. "We actually had, in our application we submitted together, we explained that really there was no way to separate one from the other ... just because we're so intertwined in our past and our work."

The jury commented that the architecture was "good and mature work that is innovative and fresh" and that the "design and built resolution of space and surface detailing" was excellent.

Batay-Csorba said they were "ecstatic" when news of the award arrived — especially because she is 39.

"This was actually the last year that I could apply for it," she said. "It was kind of our last chance. We were so happy. The people that have gotten it in the past, you know, we really look up to. We're just so happy to be included in that company."

Batay-Csorba was born and raised in Wheatley, until she moved to Windsor at age 18 to study architectural technology at St. Clair College.

After graduating, she moved to Southfield, Mich., to study at Lawrence Technological University, where she and Andrew — from Thunder Bay, Ont. — met. Their work brought them to Los Angeles, but after spending nearly a decade in the States, they began considering a move back to Canada.

"We always wanted to have our own practice together," Batay-Csorba said.

When the recession hit, the pair packed their bags and decided to move to Toronto.

"Toronto is starting to get more into contemporary design, and we wanted to be part of the growth of Toronto," she said.

TEM 4.0 Page 90 of 150 They began working in the east side of Toronto, but now are located near Jane Street and Bloor Street.

"We're definitely a progressive firm that does a lot of ... contemporary work," Batay-Csorba said. "We've done a lot of residential work, just starting on our own. Our background is larger scale institutional, mixed-use museums and things."

But when they relocated, they began focusing on houses.

"When we came to Toronto, there's so much residential work (and) that's what we dove into. All of our projects really explore sight and materiality and space. That's the thing we focus on."

The firm recently finished a double duplex project in Toronto's Parkdale neighbourhood.

"It's two duplexes that are side by side, and they have a large — the whole front façade — is a wood brise soleil, like a wooden screen, that shades a two-storey porch on the front of the building," Batay-Csorba said. "It actually lets in really awesome, filtered shadows into the house from this screen."

Hidden in the facade are animal figures.

"Based on different lighting conditions, the time of day, the altitude of the sun, and shadows from the neighbouring trees, at different times and angels you see different animals that we embedded into this wooden screen," she said.

"So every piece of architecture that we do has a story with it."

She says they had no idea what they were in for

"We were just honestly expecting to have mee really hot weather and all the news channels were going erazy talking about Harricane Harvey and how Houston is going to be really badly hit. So we went to the grocery store to go get water. We went to three major grocery stores, there was no water anywhere."

Avdalovic says it's been very chaotic.

The city's mayor, Sylvester Turner, says police have rescued more than 3,000 people during the storm.

Hurricane Harvey has already dumped an estimated 15-trillion gallons of water on the State of Texas.

### Flooding stalls traffic, closes businesses, destroys residences across Windsor-Essex

Roads were swamped, basements were inundated, and vehicles were stalled in watery streets as Windsor-Essex endured even more rain on Tuesday —less than 24 hours after being dumped upon Monday night.

Roads were swamped, basements were inundated, and vehicles were stalled in watery streets as Windsor-Essex endured even more rain on Tuesday — less than 24 hours after being dumped upon Monday night.

Windsor police urged the public not to drive "unless absolutely necessary," as <u>many road surfaces had become submerged in several inches of water</u>. Across the city, highly trafficked streets were rendered impassable.

According to Supt. Brendan Dodd, at least a dozen major routes were affected as of 4:30 p.m., including the E.C. Row Expressway, Jefferson Boulevard, Riverside Drive East, Tecumseh Road West, Dominion Boulevard, most of College Avenue, and more.

"Do not drive through standing water on roads or in parking lots," Windsor police implored, "Many reports of staffed out vehicles in flooded areas." The City of Windsor said at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday that the situation was being closely monitored and "all storm water management systems are working as designed."

But the high volume of rain continued to fill up gutters and low-lying roadways, making driving anywhere a risky proposition.

Record amounts of rain fell in the space of six hours between Monday evening and Tuesday morning, only for the deluge to begin again on Tuesday afternoon. Environment Canada issued a severe thunderstorm warning for a second time just after 1 p.m.

"Radar and observations indicate 80 to 150 millimetres have fallen between LaSalle and Tecumseh over the last four hours," the weather office said at 3:30 p.m. Tuesday. As of Tuesday evening, Environment Canada had recorded 160 millimetres of rain in LaSalle, on top of the 125 recorded there the day before, for a total of 285 millimetres in 20 hours.

"It's pretty significant," Environment Canada meteorologist Arnold Ashton said, "This area of southwestern Ontario is known for some pretty epic rainfalls. But this one is significant."

As of 6 p.m. Tuesday — by which point Environment Canada estimated that 90 per cent of the storm had passed — the City of Windsor had recorded 170 millimetres of rain at the Grand Marais Drain.

Early Tuesday, Essex Region Conservation Authority issued a <u>flood warning for all of Windsor-Essex</u>. The agency said the warning will remain in effect until at least Wednesday morning, "Rainfall amounts are surpassing storm drain capacities for areas throughout the western regions of the city and town."

Environment Canada recorded a total of 57 millimetres of rainfail at Windson Arrort on Monday. But double or even triple that amount was reported by other locales. 100 to 150 millimetres, especially in Lecumseh and Lakeshore.

"There was a lot of variability," said Environment Canada meteorologist Geoff Coulson on Tuesday morning, "What we had was a series of localized, intense thunderstorms, moving in a train from south to north."

"The areas that were right under where these storms kept tracking—they got the biggest amounts." In comparison, Environment Canada's observation site in Harrow received a paltry 14 millimetres Tuesday morning. By Tuesday afternoon, commuters were struggling to find alternate routes on river-like streets.

Businesses and institutions were also affected. <u>Devonshire Mall closed all stores for the day due to drainage</u> problems. St. Clair College cancelled all evening classes and apprenticeship sessions, as of 5 p.m.

Flood conditions at the Met Campus of Windsor Regional Hospital became so dire that the medical facility advised patients seeking emergency care to instead go to the Ouellette Campus or even the facility in Learnington.

In a statement, WRH described a "Code Grange" protocol due to "an inability to have rain water leave the facility."

Significant flooding occurred on the hospital's ground floor and in some inpatient areas. The hospital reported that water came up through main floor drains and from the parking lots directly into the building.

The Met Campus emergency department, patient food services, pharmacy, and diagnostic imaging department were all affected. Inpatient care has not been affected.

Private residences also suffered. Hundreds of homeowners all over the region received thousands of dollars in flood damage to their basements.

James Fullerton, 75, who lives on Belleperche Place in the Riverside area, was furious to find half a foot of water in his finished basement—a repeat of what happened to his home during the massive raintall that Windsor-Lecumsch endured in late September 2016.

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Flooded again! Tunerton exclaimed. Half the houses of the street are thooded again. The City Says, On. we have it all under control. But they haven't got it under control. They're totally useless."

Fullerton said he "paid a fortune" to repair and renovate his basement after the last time it was flooded. Now he'll be consulting a lawyer and he knows he's not alone. "I'm talking about people's homes."

Retirees Donna and Ray Piche, who live nearby at the intersection of St. Rose and Edward avenues, were in the midst of completing renovations to their basement which was also flooded in September 2016 and again during the winter.

They had two sump pumps running as the rain came down Tuesday around 1:30 p.m. when Ray went out to the garage to get a third one. Donna said, "By the time he came downstairs it was gushing."

The water didn't stop rising until it reached the second step of the basement stairs. Their new drywall, carpeting, bathroom and fully furnished family room were ruined in minutes. The couple shut off their water heater and furnace, and called their insurance adjuster. There wasn't much else they could do.

"What really, really bugs us is we have brand new sewers." Donna said, of lines that were put in on St. Rose in 2014 and Edward in 2015. The house was built by Ray's grandfather and the couple has lived there since 1994. Last year was the first time their basement flooded.

Belle River resident Mike Berthiaume had a similar situation at his home on Russell Woods Drive. When inches of water began filling his basement around 2 a.m. Tuesday, he frantically started running pumps and and kept at it for the rest of the day. vacuums

"It hasn't stopped. Water's still coming up. The township can't tell me why." Berthiaume said, "My problem is the sewer. I've got a backwater valve and everything, and it came right up through the drain in the floor,"

"Public works said they can't help me. They said everybody's swamped. That's my story — It's a terrible one, and I'm sure there's a lot of people in the same boat."

The Town of Tecumseh also went into flood watch mode - activating all pump stations and sending work crews to clear storm drains starting Monday night.

In a release Tuesday, the town described the weather situation as "another unprecedented rain event" similar to the rainfall of September 2016.

According to the municipality, 150 millimetres came down in the space of six hours between Monday night and Tuesday morning alone. The September 2016 storm brought 175 millimetres in six hours, followed by 195 millimetres in 12 hours.

Dan Piescie, the Town of Lecumsch's director of public works, said this most recent rainfall also qualifies as a "100-year storm event."

"It overwhelmed both the storm and sanitary (sewer) systems. We've got ponding of water on roadways." Pieseie said:

Tecumseh Mayor Gary McNamara said in a release: "Unfortunately, these extreme weather events are a new reality and municipalities cannot install the types of systems required to handle this high volume of rain."

Despite appearances. Environment Canada said the rainfall in Windsor-Essex has nothing to do with Tropical Storm Harvey and the catastrophic flooding in Houston.

"It's a different weather system," explained Geoff Coulson. "This series of storms is not related to the tropical moisture that's impacting the Gulf Coast."

## College Workers Ratify Four Year Deal



## St. Clair College Opens Windsor Residences

St. Clair College is gearing up for the fall semester by welcoming students to its on-campus housing.

The college began opening up its residences to incoming first-year students this week, with over five thousand students beginning their programs at campuses in Windsor and Chatham.

Among the hardest hit was Lajeunesse high school of the French Catholic board (Conseil scolaire eatholique Providence)

"Everything will be in place for the first day of school," said Joseph Picard, director of education for the French Catholic board.

"We have a company already in there cleaning up and making repairs. We'll be monitoring closely for mould.

"Water came in through the drain. There's one area of the school where we'll have to replace some bulkheads and repair some drywall. "It's nothing too significant."

Picard said his board had seven schools that got water to varying degrees.

In addition to Lajeunesse, water was reported at Saint Antoine, Sainte-Margeurite-d'Youville. L'Essot high school, Monseigneur Jean Noël, Saint-Edmond, Sainte Therese and Georges P. Vanier.

Area boards reported most schools were cleaned up by Wednesday afternoon leaving the hallways filled with the buzz of fans and humidifiers to ensure things are completely dried out by next week.

Windsor-Essex Catholic District School Board spokesman Stephen Fields said his board had 10 schools flood.

TEM 4.0 Page 103 of 150 said, "Brennan looked like it got rocked hard. We've got some damage to the floor in the gymnasium.

"We don't know the full extent of the damage or whether it needs replacing yet."

Fields added Holy Names high school also got water as the roof drains couldn't handle the volume of rain that come pouring down Tuesday.

The other eight schools impacted were Corpus Christi, St. Rose, St. James, Christ the King, Notre Dame, Our Lady of Perpetual Help, St. Mary and St. Gabriel elementary schools.

"It doesn't look like there's anything that will impact the first day of school," Fields said. "There might be a couple of minor inconveniences, such as not being able to use the gym at Brennan."

The Greater Essex County District School Board had 16 schools affected by floodwater, but suffered no major damage.

Board spokesman Scott Scantlebury said the affected schools will largely in South Windsor, east Windsor and a couple in LaSalle.

Scantlebury said Massey Secondary School and Glenwood elementary were the hardest hit schools.

"All the schools have already been cleaned up and we'll be ready to welcome students on the first day of school Tuesday," Scantlebury said.

"They'll find no evidence of what happened.

"Our maintenance people got on it right away (Tuesday night) and had already completed cleaning up (by Wednesday morning). We didn't need to call in any outside help.

"It was mostly water coming up from drains. There was no structural damage, no drywall was damaged."

Other public schools getting water included Giles French Immersion Campus, Northwood, Ford City, Herman Academy, Kennedy, Hugh Beaton, Marlborough, David Maxwell, Princess Elizabeth, Dr. David Suzuki, Sandwich West, Queen Victoria, Sandwich West, Sandwich high school and Western Facility Service Building.

St. Clair College, which cancelled night classes Tuesday due to road conditions, was open on Wednesday.

The college is hosting thousands of students for orientation this week.

"We had no impact from the water," said John Fairley, vice-president of communications and community relations. "We're open for business."

The University of Windsor also was open and operating normally Wednesday.

"There were no flooding issues at the university related to the storm," said John Coleman, the university's director of public affairs and communications.

# Back to School: Keeping up and innovating is education's great challenge

With knowledge doubling at an exponential speed, educators admit there's a great deal of irony in watching the system grapple with the need to innovate rapidly.

Schools should be at the cutting edge when it comes to responding to a changing world, said Paul Picard, director of education for the Windsor-Essex Catholic School Board.

"In reality, it's difficult to effect change and enhance creativity in a system that is so highly structured. Education is actually a conservative institution, though we promote ourselves as dynamic."

In Picard's opinion, promoting creativity and flexibility are the biggest challenge educators face.

"We need to develop a whole new kind of student for this environment," Picard said.

"What's going to be important in the future is being able to self-manage, being able to time manage and manage information. We have to find a way to have discerning learners, critical thinkers.... Schools have to be flexible vehicles to promote opportunities for students, not be rigid institutions that exclude movement."

One of the most popular and rapidly expanding areas of innovation in education is in experiential learning. High school students now have a choice of programs like specialist high skills majors, dual credits that count toward post-secondary education and co-op education.

"Instead of using a one-size-fits-all approach, students can customize their high school experience to match their strengths, interests and career goals," said Heather Irwin, senior media relations coordinator for the Ministry of Education.

Since 2006-07, the specialist high skills majors program has grown from about 600 students to 48,000 in Ontario.

Locally, the Greater Essex County District School Board will have over 1,200 students in 56 specialist high skills majors programs this year. The Catholic board will have over 440 students in 20 programs.

The Catholic board is also unveiling two major high school programs this fall: a science, technology, engineering and math academy at Holy Names and a construction academy at St. Joseph's. The academies are aimed at correcting the mismatch between the skills of graduating students and the skills that are in demand in the job market.

The science, technology, engineering and math program will involve the University of Windsor and St. Clair College. The two post-secondary institutions will supply instructors and mentors, as well as invite students onto their campuses for some hands-on experiences.

"This program is unique in North America in that it embeds our students in the classroom," said Chris Houser, dean of the science at the University of Windsor, "They will serve as mentors, give high school students a chance to talk to a university student. It'll help those middle-of-theroad students have a chance to see themselves as possible scientists. More experiential learning is a huge part of the future in education."

The long-term plan is to give students who complete the four-year science, technology, engineering and math program university credits for their work, he said.

Houser also envisions high school students participating in the university's foreign research trips such his annual trip to Costa Rica.

Jonathon Azzopardi, chair of the Canadian Association of Mould Makers, said industry welcomes more partnerships with schools.

"We're trying to create opportunities for ourselves to get into high schools and get in front of kids," said Azzopardi, president of I aval International, "The integration of high schools, post-secondary (institutions) and industry in education has tremendous potential. It's common in other countries like Brazil and Germany."

Increasingly, the private sector is providing resources to support programs. The Windsor Construction Association plans to hold a golf tournament to help raise funds to buy materials for student projects in the construction academy. The Canadian Masonry Centre created a textbook for the masonry program at Brennan Secondary School.

"Ungaging with education is critical for us in my opinion," said Jim Lyons, executive director of the Windsor Construction Association. "We need recruits. Not everyone is going to be a doctor or professional. We've got a lot of work available and soon we'll have a (the Gordie Howe International) bridge to build."

The local public board's e-STEAM program, which launches this fall at Tecumseh V1sta, 1s another initiative involving the university — along with the EPICentre, Hackforge, the WEtech Alliance, Workforce WindsorEssex and the WindsorEssex Small Business Centre.

The program, which is believed to be the first of its kind in Ontario, focuses on entrepreneurship in the areas of science, technology, engineering, the arts and math.

It will include classroom credits, experiential learning opportunities, collaborative projects, an entrepreneurial centre, field trips, partnerships in the community and scholarships.

Tecumseh Vista teacher Emily Li Causi said students will get a certificate of special recognition along with their high school diploma for completing the different aspects of the program, which include community hours and tackling challenges to solve problems presented to them.

"Students focus on grades, the end product," Li Causi said. "This program won't do that. It'll be more about the process because that's what entrepreneurship involves. You can't be afraid to fail. It's try, pivot, try again. That's how you nurture an entrepreneurial spirit."

The selection of innovative programs isn't just aimed at industry.

The public board's Learnington District Secondary School has developed a stellar environmental program that has hosted an international conference on Lake Erie algae blooms and has drawn the attention of both the Ministry of Education and federal Environment Minister Catherine McKenna.

These innovative approaches and programs are increasingly reshaping education.

Even the traditional classroom is being redesigned, as was done with E.J. Lajeunesse Secondary School's unveiling of a classroom of the future last spring. With group tables, workspaces at windows, artwork and bright paint colours, plants and computer stations, it looks more like the office environment students will eventually find when employed. The French Catholic board hopes to reproduce many of the features as it updates classrooms.

"It's an exciting time to be an educator," said public board superintendent Clara Howitt. "Nothing is static. That's the challenge, to create conditions that energize students to be successful when they graduate."

That means exploring new approaches through pilot projects, such as the year-long Makerspace study being launched this fall at Prince Edward Elementary School.

The study, which is being done in association with the Ontario Institute for Studies in Education, will look at how students create, innovate and explore using different materials to make things in group settings. Three teachers at the school will also receive specialized professional development to support the \$35,000 study.

Hughes said the concept is particularly adaptive for use in robotics, coding and 3-D printing.

"It creates the conditions to promote creative thinking, problem-solving, innovation, communication and collaboration," she said. "Those are all skills employers tells us they want in employees."

#### Ontario pushing innovation

The Ministry of Education has tried to accelerate the pace of change in schools across the province by placing a greater focus on innovation and technology in recent years. Among those efforts was the creation of the ministry's system planning, research and innovation division last May.

The province is also throwing more money at professional development and technological resources. In mid-August, it announced it was setting aside \$10-million to create a new Innovation in Learning Fund. The fund will provide more professional development opportunities and help implement innovations in learning and teaching. Each of Ontario's 72 school boards will get an annual grant of \$109,000 from the fund.

The ministry is spending an additional \$10-million to purchase more technological and digital tools for students.

There is also funding to provide all school boards with support for online learning, more resources and software, improved broadband services, and to document and share best practices.

"To be able to succeed and achieve excellence in today's rapidly changing world, students need a new toolkit of skills," said Minister of Education Mitzie Hunter.

# Transit service begins between Windsor and LaSalle

Trying to get from Windsor to LaSalle, or vice versa? Now you can take a bus.


Tuesday morning marked the debut of transit service between the two municipalities. From now on, the new <u>LaSalle 25 route</u> will have buses making regular trips between the St. Clair College eampus in South Windsor and LaSalle's Vollmer Complex.

"The beauty of this is that it's a seamless service," said Windsor Mayor Drew Dilkens—one of the passengers of the inaugural bus ride.

Transit Windsor is responsible for the route. The Town of LaSalle is paying \$400,000 annually for the service.

The new arrangement has been in development for years, but Dilkens pointed out there's a historical precedent: transit service previously existed between Windsor and LaSalle in the 1970s.

"We think there's some demand. I aSalle thinks there's demand," Dilkens said, "Hopefully, this is the framework that lets us expand the service further into Essex County."

The route will operate between 7 a m. and 7 p.m. Monday to Saturday. One bus will be dedicated to the route for those times, with a second bus joining the route during peak morning and afternoon hours.

The route has more than 90 stops, including the shopping plazas of Malden Road and Front Road. It takes about 90 minutes for one bus to make a complete loop.

According to the Town of LaSalle, the route encompasses approximately 75 per cent of all residences in LaSalle.

LaSalle Mayor Ken Antaya — who greeted Dilkens at the Vollmer Complex — emphasized that the bus will be free to ride for the first four months of its debut. September to December of this year.

There will be no fares until Jan. 1, 2018, when the bus will have the standard Transit Windsor fare of \$3 per single ride.

"This is another step in the progress of the community." Antaya said, "We're anxious to see how the community embraces it."

The Town of LaSalle ushered in its new bus route Tuesday morning and there was talk of expansion even before the inaugural ride was through

"It's the start again of regional transit," said Windsor Mayor Drew Dilkens, "Something we haven't seen since the 1970s,"

Dilkens and LaSalle Mayor Ken Antaya were joined by the media and a handful of curious commuters as they tried out the new route.

"The reality here is in the City of Windsor we have the largest transit system in Essex County," said Dilkens, who is keen to expand transit into neighbouring communities, "It's very easy for us to scale up and add incremental service like the town of LaSalle,"

Dilkens said similar partnerships were discussed with Tecumseh and Lakeshore. Neither town has plans to join at this time.

"I think it's important as we mature as a community," said Antaya, adding the service will primarily hit the northern half of LaSalle, but could expand in the future. LaSalle partnered with Windsor Transit to purchase 2 buses. One starting at St. Clair College and one in the Morton Drive and Front Road area. The entire route takes about 45 minutes to travel, and connects with Transit Windsor routes.

Service operates Monday to Saturday 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.Passengers can ride the LaSalle route for free until December 31st.

St. Clair's men's baseball team has won four-straight OCAA titles and will host this year's championship next month while the women's softball team advanced to the Canadian Collegiate Softball Association championship tournament a year ago. In soccer, both the men's team and women's team advanced to the OCAA championship tournament last season

#### Men's baseball

After four-straight titles, head coach Dave Cooper's squad opens the season on Saturday with a doubleheader against George Brown at Lacase Park and then hosts Seneca on Sunday for two more.

"It's going to be an interesting team," Cooper said. "Our average age in the past was probably 24 and now it's about 19."

St. Clair will rely on a strong starting pitching staff that features returning right-hander Kyle Breitner and left-hander Taylor Pappin. Right-hander Micah Harris should take on a bigger role while freshman right-hander Seth Chauvin and freshman left-hander Mitchell Prsa will also figure in the rotation.

Offensively, the Saints will look to produce offence this year with speed more than power.

Freshman Carson Burke and Austin Oulds can both fly while third-year shortstop Kevin Dion also adds speed and batted over .300 a year ago. Third baseman Matt Bondy, who is a transfer from Sienna Heights University, adds a veteran presence to the lineup while Cooper is hoping for some power from freshman first baseman Mike McKay. Outfielder Brendan Renaud and second baseman Patrick Kibble, who are both freshmen, will also get the chance to start.

"We don't hit and have the power we've had in the past," Copper said. "We have to be perfect on offence, move runners and not strikeout."

#### Women's softball

Softball head coach Doug Wiseman's team gets rolling on Friday with a road doubleheader against Conestoga before returning home on Sunday for a doubleheader with Durham.

Wiseman announced four more recruits this season and his 17-player roster will feature nine new faces from the team that won the pennant a year ago and took OCAA silver.

"I feel really good about the team this year," Wiseman said. "I expect good things."

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The Saints have strength up the middle with veteran second baseman Sarah Bondy and shortstop Michaela Rillett. Wiseman also has high hopes for veteran Megan Lumley, who moves to first base from centerfield, and pitcher Allison Telfer.

Freshman Olivia Elliott will add to a strong pitching staff that features Jenna Pierce and Sara Stiller.

St. Clair also has high hopes for freshmen outfielders Madisyn Clark and Jordyn Clark along with third baseman Jordan Taylor, who are all left-handed hitters.

"We lost some key players, but I'm focused on who we've got and the ones we have are good to build upon," Wiseman said.

#### Men's soccer

Head coach Mike Baraslievski's squad is coming off a West Division title last year and will open the season at home on Saturday against Redeemer.

Baraslievski lost 15 players off last year's 22-man roster and the team will lean heavily on veteran goalie Shane Beaton and midfielders Stefan Zastavnikovic and Martin Nyul while hoping defender Cameron Anger recovers quickly from injury and is able to get back in the lineup.

"For sure we're going to be leaning on the veterans," Baraslievski said. "They're proven starters and part of a division champion. Our success is going to depend on how they do."

Forward Korede Adepitan battled injury during last year's outdoor season, but was solid during in the indoor season and Baraslievski hopes he can continue that this fall.

Luca Pasini and Max lannetta move from the bench into starting roles on defence this year while freshmen Joshua Hunter and Adam Thompson will see early action. Evan Mendonca and Bastien Aguilera will be at midfield.

"We have some good, young players, but they are young," Baraslievski said. "We should be one of the better teams in our division. Barring any major injuries, we should be in position to challenge for the top."

#### Women's soccer

Kris Geier, who served as head coach from 1987-2002, returns as head coach. His squad opens play at home on Saturday against Redeemer and the club returns just four starters in striker Julie Albeartie, midfielder Melanie Jubenville and defenders Alexis Provost and Cassie Nicholas.

"We've got a lot of new faces, so it'll be interesting to see how they react to their first game," Geier said. "I'm kind of nervous and kind of excited."

The Saints have high hopes for freshman Jaclyn French at forward. Freshman Alexandria Schooley will get to start early at midfield while the team added Charesse Thomas-Tate, a transfer from the University of Ontario Institute of Technology, and will see Ravneet Rana start at the back and freshman Tory Brown open the season in goal.

"Our first four games are at home, so we have to do well and see where we stand," Geier said.



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# Event at St. Clair College launches suicide prevention awareness week

Suicide is still occurring both locally and across the country far too often, so nearly 300 people gathered Sunday to mark World Suicide Prevention Day and kick off awareness week.

Suicide is still occurring both locally and across the country far too often, so nearly 300 people gathered Sunday to mark World Suicide Prevention Day and kick off awareness week.

Roughly 4,000 Canadians each year decide to take their own life — an average of more than 10 per day. They leave behind shattered family and friends who are often filled with guilt for missing the signs and not doing enough to reach out.

"Today helps people start the conversation because that is where it begins," said Claudia den Boer, CEO of the local Canadian Mental Health Association, "We need to talk about the anxiety we all feel in different periods of our lives. It's important to keep talking about it with our family and friends.

"People should know the signs and reach out when it gets beyond an ability to cope. Today, people are more aware and the stigma is less. We can all talk about (suicide) more and that's where it all starts."

Sunday's kick-off event at St. Clair College themed, "You Are Not Alone," included a five-kilometre walk, plus speeches from area mental health officials and those touched personally by suicide.

"Today means community support for those affected by challenges of mental health and suicide," said Andrea Milne, who participated in honour of Jordan Caine of Tecumseh, who took his own life at the age of 27 in August 2014.

"In my opinion, what needs to change is how we perceive mental health. It should be treated the same as any physical health care issue — that way we are not missing the whole picture. We need to treat the whole person and not just what we can physically see. We need more services and that would help decrease the (suicide) numbers."

Those most susceptible to suicide include men in the ages between 40 to 55, plus youth, den Boer said.

Possible signs may include talking about suicide, substance abuse, anxiety, feelings of hopelessness, increased withdrawal or anger and reckless behaviour.

"fhat's why it's so important to have events like this to raise awareness and get the messages out there," den Boer said, "There is help available,"

## Faculty At Ontario Colleges Vote To Strike If Necessary

Faculty at Ontario's public colleges have voted to strike if necessary, as talks continue between the faculty union and the College Employer Council.

Ontario Public Service Employees Union (OPSEU) says 68% of all faculty at colleges throughout the province voted in favour of a strike mandate on Thursday, with collective bargaining scheduled to resume next week.

A strike has the potential to impact students at all 24 colleges in Ontario, including St. Clair College, Lambton College and Fanshawe College.

A strike or lockout deadline has not been set at this time.

Key issues in during talks, which began ten weeks ago, include the role of faculty in academic decision-making and fair treatment for contract faculty.

"Highty-one percent of college teaching is done by contract faculty, all of whom have no job security and are paid significantly less than the negotiated rates for full-time permanent faculty." OPSEU says in a statement, "With the introduction of Bill 148, the Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act, 'equal pay for equal work' has become a top issue not only for college faculty, but for college administration as well."

The collective agreement for 12,000 professors, instructors, counsellors, and librarians expires on September 30.





Benoit said more than \$20 million has been invested in the Chatham site, including an \$11-million Healthplex, a \$5-million Trade and Technology Centre, a \$2-million 48-bed student residence and nearly a \$1-million renovation of the Mary Uniac Health Science Centre.

The student government. Thames Campus Incorporated, also spearheaded a \$1.6-million project to expand and upgrade the student centre.

And more investment is happening with construction beginning on a new \$2-million National Powerline Training Centre.

"The next expansion for this campus is adding on to the residence." Benoît said.

ITEM 4.0 Page 134 of 150 "Our residence has been filled since we started," he said, adding there is a wait list of at least 50 students.

He noted popular programs including powerline training, occupational therapy and physiotherapy assistant, along with nursing and health science programs, are attracting students from across the province.

Benoît recalls when he arrived in 2004, there were 770 students enrolled in Chatham. That reached a high of 1,300, but slipped back to about 1,250 students, he added

"The college has added at least one new program or more since 2004 until 2016," he said, adding this year is the first year in a long time since a new program wasn't added in Chatham.

However, that will soon change.

Benoît said the plan is to grow the enrolment to 1,500 students, which will be achieved by adding new, unique programs.

Ann Hetherington, director of marketing, said a "ton of work" has been done by the homecoming committee in Chatham to invite the community to take part in this special celebration.

Benoît said the weekend kicks off with a Friday Flashback on Sept. 29.



### Premier Aviation sells Windsor facility

AAR plans to continue employing all 300 current employees in Windsor

Premier Aviation has sold its Windsor operation to AAR, a global aviation company, which currently has no plans to cut positions.

Premier, a Canadian-owned aircraft maintenance and repair company, opened its 143,000 square-foot Windsor site in 2012. The AAR purchase also includes the sale of Premier's operation at the Trois-Rivières Airport in Québec.

The Windsor facility includes a "full back shop capability" and enough space to house six narrow-body aircraft, according to a media release

"We are pleased that the customers and employees of these facilities will continue to be well-supported," said Ronnie DiBartolo, President of Premier Aviation. "This transaction also allows Premier to focus its resources on future areas for growth at our other two MRO facilities."

The sale won't affect a partnership between the Premier site and St. Clair College, according to Ron Seguin.

The college's vice president of international relations and training explained the school and company set up a special plane-maintenance program with the company, but the purchase hasn't had an impact on students who are currently enrolled.

"For our students going to work it's full steam ahead," he said.

Those taking part in the program still have a chance to continue working at the site after they graduate in about a month, he added.

"It was all very seamless for us." said Seguin. "Our students have been welcomed."



### Premier Aviation sells Windsor operation

Premier Aviation has sold its Windsor operation, which was touted when it opened in 2012 as a new industry for this area.

Premier Aviation has sold its Windsor aircraft MRO (maintenance, repair and overhaul) facility to AAR, an American company that leads the aircraft aftermarket industry around the globe. Mayor Drew Dilkens, who said he has been aware of the pending sale for months, said there is nothing but upside for the city and the workers at the hangar.

"The long story short here is that we should see more business at our MRO which is great for the city and great for employment," said Dilkens.

The 143,000-square-foot Premier Aviation operation opened in 2012, a project of former mayor Eddie Francis, that saw \$23 million of taxpayers' money go into construction.

Dilkens said there were a number of factors that resulted in frequent downtime at the facility due in part that Premier Aviation is a relatively small Canadian company.

"A company like AAR — because they have the breadth and the experience and they're just good at what they do — they can keep that pipeline full that's going into the facility," said Dilkens.

"I think that's different from what we had with Premier. This isn't about bashing Premier, I'm not, it's just something that's different with the scale of AAR."

The Wood Dale, Ill.-based AAR also purchased a 150,000-square-foot Premier Aviation facility in Trois-Rivieres, Que., that has been in operation since 2002.

"We are excited to add an experienced workforce and two world-class facilities to our award-winning MRO network, and we look forward to growing our position in, and bringing more flexibility and value to, the Canadian market," said John Holmes, president and chief operating officer of AAR in a news release.

"The culture of continuous improvement and execution excellence at these facilities is consistent with AAR's commitment to the highest levels of service."

The release also stated that "the facilities have made significant investments in tooling over the past few years and currently employ over 300 well-trained aviation mechanics and personnel who will retain their positions based on expected workload."

AAR's vice-president of strategic communications Kathleen Cantillon could not say how many are currently working in Windsor.

Shortly after announcing the sale, AAR and Air Canada announced a \$500-million contract for servicing of Air Canada jets at the Trois-Rivieres facility.

Dilkens said he plans to reach out to AAR soon to see how Windsor can benefit from the new regime.

"They're a public company, they're publicly traded, they're the real deal, they're big, they're successful and they certainly have what it takes to make that facility shine," said Dilkens.

"Knowing the capabilities of that facility that we have built, and knowing the background of AAR, if anyone can make this work and get that facility running at full throttle, it's a company like AAR. So I'm excited about that."

St. Clair College had teamed with Premier Aviation for an aircraft mechanic course but that endeavour winds up in November, Dilkens said.

Premier Aviation president Ronnie DiBartolo said his company will now focus on its two remaining operations.

"We are honoured that a company with the reputation, breadth and depth of AAR has recognized the quality of our MRO facilities, and we are pleased that the customers and employees of these facilities will continue to be well-supported," said DiBartolo.

AAR began as the Allen Aircraft Radio company in Chicago in 1950 supplying radios to the fledgling commercial airline industry and has grown over the years to become a complete aftermarket airline supply and maintenance company.







The prime source for international students has been China and India, the world's two most populous nations.

"I can remember not long ago when we only had 200 international students," said France, who has seen enrolment grow by 24 per cent in three years

"We've been focused on increasing that. We're working with agents overseas, building relationships. Staff are being sent over two or three times a year to visit schools personally."

Perhaps the best advertising for the college has been the international students who come to St. Clair, said France.

"Word-of-mouth has been huge," she said: "With social media, kids are tweeting to friends and family back home. They're making videos.

"We had an international students' orientation event last week and the social media from that was tremendous

"The college's profile and its reputation have been raised."

There has also been a greater emphasis on recruiting international students for the Windsor and Charham campuses

Bolstering the college's sales pitch has been the aggressive expansion of programming and upgrading of infrastructure during the last 15 years.

The latest program launches include graduate certificates in human resources management, web and interactive advertising and event management.

A National Powerline Training Centre will also open late next year on the college's Chatham campus to expand the powerline technician program.

Pending Ministry of Education approval, the college hopes to be able to offer two new degree programs as early as next September.

France said the college is well positioned financially to continue its growth having run an \$8-million surplus in the last fiscal year.





Revenues: June 30 YTD - Year over Year











Revenues: June 30 YTD - Actual to Budget





Expenditures: June 30 YTD - Year over Year










