Notice Re: Retiree Member Contact Information

The St. Clair College Retirees' Association collects, compiles and maintains basic membership contact information. This information is intended **ONLY** to meet the needs of the Association. On occasion, the Association has received requests for access to the information pertaining to members, therefore, a policy was developed and approved in March, 2019 to define the conditions under which personal information would be released. The information compiled by the Association is primarily collected for the purpose of communicating with the members of the Association, and every effort is made to collect and retain accurate, current data.

Policy:

The St. Clair College Retirees' Association shall not disclose personal information in its custody or under its control except:

- (a) for the purpose for which it was obtained or compiled or for a consistent purpose;
- (b) where the person to whom the information relates has identified that information in particular and has consented to its disclosure;
- (c) for the purpose of complying with an Act of the Legislature, an Act of Parliament, or a Court Order;
- (d) in compassionate circumstances, to facilitate contact with the next of kin or a friend of an individual who is injured, ill or deceased.

You may have seen new reports warning against abbreviating the date year now that we've moved into 2020.

If you were used to just giving only the final two digits of the year, as in 1/1/19, you shouldn't use that technique this year.

The reason: if you dated a document as 1/1/20, an unscrupulous person could change that to, say 1/1/2015 or 1/1/2030. This could enable them to make serious trouble with some legal documents.

So, instead, you should write 1/1/2020. Get into the habit and save yourself some trouble.

Checking SPAM in Gmail

When someone complains about not seeing SCCRA e-mails, they are asked to check the Spam folder.

BUT do you have a Spam folder in Gmail? If not, check the following setting:

- While in Gmail, click on **Settings** (the gear icon in the right top corner)
- Select **Settings** from the drop-down menu
- Click on **Manage Labels** on the left (no, not Inbox)
- Scroll down a bit and locate "Spam"
- The word **Show** should be in **bold black**.
- If **Hide** is in **bold black**, then **click on Show or Show if unread**
- Close the Settings window

Did you know that the period in your name in Gmail e-mail addresses is optional?

Garber.Ken@gmail is the same as GarberKen@gmail or even g.a.r.b.e.r.k.e.n@gmail. Also, e-mail addresses are NOT case-sensitive. **


Save The Date Wednesday, May 13, 2020 -- 2:00 p.m.

Important Notice Regarding Retiree Parking Permits

As one of the benefits of Retiree Association Membership, St. Clair College provides complimentary parking for retirees. The old 3-year retiree parking permits have expired and are no longer valid. Parking tags must be renewed to avoid receiving a parking ticket.

Change To Retiree Parking Passes

The Retiree Parking Pass duration has been shortened to one year. Parking permits are renewed at the Parking Office in the Main Lobby. The renewal process is easy.

- ➤ When renewing, **bring photo ID**, **your current SCCRA membership card**, **your completed application form**, and to be safe **your current parking permit**., to the Parking Office, and a new parking tag will be issued.
- ➤ Please note that all applicants must apply in person; you cannot obtain a permit for anyone else, not even a close family relative
- ➤ Your Parking permit is **not to be shared with family and friends**. Failure to do this **may jeopardize the privilege of complimentary parking for retirees** at the South Campus.

Retirees with a current Handicap Parking permit should present that permit to the Parking Desk when applying for the College Retiree parking tag. You will be issued with a College Retiree Handicap parking tag.

Meet Your Newsletter Editor - Tony Ellul



Tony was born in Malta in October 1947 – the eldest of eight - when the country was still in ruins from massive round-the-clock aerial bombardment by the combined air forces of the Axis Powers during WWII - the Luftwaffe and the Regia Aeronautica.

In October 1958, Tony began his high school education at the Malta Lyceum, at the time, the foremost publicly funded boys' secondary grammar school in Malta. When he graduated in 1963 having successfully passed the University of Oxford "O" level exams, at 4 months short of his 16th birthday, Tony was too young to attain his goal of admittance to the Malta Teachers' College or for any form of employment. He therefore continued his studies in the 6th Form at the Malta Lyceum in preparation for matriculation to the University of Malta. Because Tony's parents could not afford to pay for a university education, Tony continued his education in Business Studies at the newly established Malta Polytechnic.

Impatient to move on and to start earning income, Tony was actively looking for employment. His chance came when he learned that the Royal Air Force (RAF) was recruiting. He enlisted in mid-summer 1965 and began basic training at the end of September 1965 - less than two weeks before his 18th birthday. Following basic training, the RAF sent Tony to England for training as an electronics technician in airfield radio communications and navigational aids. He returned to Malta in the spring of 1966 where he served at RAF Luqa and its VHF/UHF station RAF Dingli until his discharge in April 1970.

Emma and Tony began dating in late 1966. They were later to discover that in the early 1950s they had been classmates in kindergarten taught by Augustinian nuns. Persistent reports in the late 1960s of the closure of British military bases in Malta and the resultant mass unemployment, led Emma and Tony to the decision to emigrate to Canada. They married in March 1970, two weeks prior to Tony's discharge from the RAF. Two weeks later, in mid-April, Emma and Tony arrived in Windsor.

Soon after their arrival in Windsor, Tony began working

for an electronics manufacturing company, but was laid off 6 months later on his 23rd birthday. Other jobs followed, each ending in layoff. Wearied by the layoffs, Tony decided that he needed a career change; so he enrolled in St. Clair College Con-Ed classes in Business Data Processing (today we call it IT), then transferred into full-time studies and graduated in June 1974. From 1974 to 1980, Tony held positions in IT in three different companies as computer programmer-systems analyst and supervisor of computer operations while attaining the designation of Certified Systems Professional. In late 1980, Tony came to St. Clair College as a faculty member in the Computer Studies/IT Department where he served until his retirement in October 2012.

Emma and Tony have a daughter, Vanessa, who is married to Stas – both of whom are University of Windsor graduates in electrical engineering. Vanessa works at Ford of Canada as a Manufacturing Systems IT Analyst. Vanessa and Stas have two children – Aleksander 9, and Isabella 7.

From 1975 to 1995, Emma and Tony were members of the Teutonia Choir and travelled with the choir to give performances in several cities in Canada and the U.S.A. In 1990, Emma and Tony were among a small group of people who founded the Teutonia Tanz- und Trachtengruppe (TTTG), a group of adults dedicated to performing traditional German folk dances in traditional German folk costume. They travelled with the TTTG to give performances in many cities in Canada, the U.S.A., and Germany. Emma was treasurer for the TTTG for a number of years and Tony was president of the group from 1998 until its dissolution in 2007.

Tony has a number of interests. He enjoys reading (mostly history and travel), watching documentaries about history, science, and travel, and listening to classical music. Most of all, Tony enjoys spending time with his grandchildren. **

SCCRA Winter Trip 2020

Early in the afternoon of January 23, 2020, fourteen St. Clair College retirees and friends met at Windsor Airport for the start of the annual winter trip – this time to the Royalton Hicacos Resort in Varadero Cuba. Our flight left on time, arriving uneventfully on time at Varadero Airport, where after the passport control and customs formalities, our private transfer bus met us to take us to the resort. We arrived at the resort at about 8:30 p.m., where the friendly staff greeted us with cold glasses of sangria.

Checking in was quick and came with a surprise. The customary wrist tag issued by the front desk staff to each guest - as is customary in most all-inclusive hotels - served also as the key to our rooms; very convenient, no keys to carry around or lose. While bellhop service escorted us on foot to our rooms, the butler service delivered our luggage to our rooms; also very convenient. We did not need to haul our bags, which was a good thing because the hotel property is very large and its overall layout is quite different.



As often is the case, the focus of the resort is the reception area, the pool, the main bar (there are several bars, including two at the beach), the open-air theatre, and the main buffet facility where breakfast is served. Guest rooms are located in one of 31 detached buildings, that the hotel calls bungalows, scattered on either side of the resort centre. Each bungalow, most of which are three story walk-ups, consists of an average of 14 rooms. The distances from the bungalows to the central location and the walk-ups can be challenging for guests with mobility issues. The layout of the spacious rooms is on two levels separated by two steps. The upper entry level serves as a living room, while the lower level consists of the sleeping area and a very spacious bathroom. Each room has its own balcony overlooking a garden area. Interestingly, none of the rooms has an ocean view, because a strip of woodland screens the beautiful beach from the guest rooms. Also interesting is that the beach is divided into

non-smoking and smoking areas. Access to the beach is via a boardwalk that can also be a challenge to mobility.

We were fortunate to have a very efficient, helpful, and friendly resort staff. The front desk people, the bellhops, the butlers, the cleaning staff, and the cooking and serving staff at the restaurants met us with delightful smiles and the occasional hug. Even the gardeners often greeted us with a smile and a, "Hola amigo."

The main buffet restaurant is on the second floor accessible by a flight of steps adjacent to the open-air theatre. A nearby elevator is available for the mobility challenged. The food was plentiful and varied, and of special interest for guests who like fish and seafood. The main buffet served grilled fresh mahi-mahi, seabass, hake, coalfish (pollock), and tilapia both at lunch and dinner. It was refreshing that we did not need to make reservations for dinner at the specialty restaurants, although this sometimes resulted in line-ups. In the evenings, the Beach Grill served a menu of seafood that included grilled lobster and lobster soup. The main buffet area also served a variety of seafood – grilled spiny lobster, two varieties of crab, mussels, clams, razor clams, shrimp, and oysters. At dinnertime, diners at each specialty restaurant were entertained with live music provided by a violin-guitar duo, a saxophone-guitar duo, a solo violinist, and so on – very delightful.



Every evening, our group members met at the main bar for drinks at what has become our customary traditional "happy hour" get-together followed by dinner at the location of their individual choice. Following dinner, guests had the opportunity to round off the day with lively live entertainment at the open-air theatre.

On our first full day, the resort offered an outdoor cookout with food prepared at seven or eight different huts located near the boardwalk leading to the beach. The food included grilled fresh fish, paella, barbecued beef, pork, and chicken, several kinds of salads, and

pig roasted over hot coals at a nearby open barbecue pit.



The weather was just right; warm enough but not too hot, while a pleasant breeze helped to dissipate the heat and humidity. We did get a sudden torrential downpour during dinnertime two days before our departure and another cloudburst the evening before we left.



Two couples from our group took very informative day trips to Havana, one couple in a 1950s renovated (even-air-conditioned) Oldsmobile and the other couple in a 1953 Chevrolet BelAir. Both couples were accompanied by private tour-guides. Two more couples spent an exciting day sailing on a catamaran tour on the blue Caribbean where they had the opportunity to get in the water for a close encounter with dolphins. **

Forever Friends - Herb Stammler And Don Yates

In 1970, Dr. Quittenton and Roy Giroux felt that it would be a good idea to start a College Alumni Association founded upon the existing base of W.O.I.T. graduates. Because of his background with the University of Windsor Alumni Board, Bill Totten was asked to take on this assignment. A small group of W.O.I.T. grads had already been meeting as 'alumni' in each other's homes and this group became the 'founders' of the St. Clair College Alumni Association. Prominent amongst this group were W.O.I.T. graduates Herb Stammler and Don Yates.

Herb was one of the earliest Presidents of what was to become a model Alumni Association in the Ontario College system. Don Yates eventually became an active member of the St. Clair College Board of Governors. Working with other recent graduates, Herb and Don founded the St. Clair College Alumni Association, which went on to organize, among many other activities, exciting and eventful Homecoming Weekends. Both of these graduates were also active community volunteers outside of their St. Clair contributions.

When asked by his niece Janis to recall a significant memory of those days, Herb was quoted as saying; "The most memorable one was when I went to College (WOIT), it was in an old run down grade school that was converted into a College. I led a delegation of students to Toronto to put on a presentation to the Minister of Education to plead for a new school building. We left with the pledge that when the population grew to 500, a new school would be built. That school is now St. Clair College."

After suffering with Parkinson's for many years Herb Stammler, passed away on Friday, December 27, 2019. Don Yates passed away on Tuesday, December 31, 2019, only 3 days later. All who knew and worked with them will remember Herb and Don as two close friends who went to school together and worked together on behalf of St. Clair College. **
