Community Support By St. Clair College Retirees

St. Clair College retiree and SC-CRA member Walter Stechyshyn, who is a member of the Sprucedale United Church congregation in Chatham, has been doing his part to support his community during the 2020 pandemic year. Walter has been using his woodcarving skills to produce what he calls Comfort Birds that he donates to residents of Chatham-Kent



Hospice and their families in their hour of need. The following is the text of a short interview in which Walter shares his story about his Comfort Birds.

What is a comfort bird?

A comfort bird is a small, stylized woodcarving, intentionally designed to be held and handled.

What is their purpose?

They are intended to bring comfort to anyone facing life-changing circumstances, regardless of cause.



How do they do this?

Wood is a living material

which is warm to the touch. Their shape can be recognized by touch alone, providing a point of focus outside the body and a source for pleasant memories.

Why are they used?

The birds have meaning for people regardless of whether or not they have a religious belief. They lend themselves easily to different symbolic interpretations and metaphors.

Who receives a comfort bird?

The person receiving a bird as a gift may be a resident of Hospice or a member of their family.

How is this decided and by whom?

The Supportive and Spiritual Care Provider person for Hospice decides through interactions with the family who and when someone may benefit by receiving the gift of a bird.

Who carves and provides the birds that Hospice uses? The birds are individually carved and finished by Walter Stechyshyn.

John loves his work, especially as it involves extensive interaction with student groups, staff, alumni, and community partners.

His most satisfying experience to date was planning and coordinating the College's 50th Anniversary Celebrations. A very close second would be organizing the Polar Plunge (Brrr!) for the Special Olympics.

Community Support By St. Clair College Retirees

Jay Terryberry is a recent St. Clair College retiree and



member of the SCCRA who prior to his retirement was a faculty member in the Landscape Horticulture Program at the College.

Jay is currently President of the Windsor Chapter of Landscape Ontario (LOWC), a member chapter of Landscape Ontario (LO). Early in the fall of 2020, Landscape Ontario

launched a *Garden Makeover* project for each of its 11 chapters. Individuals from across the province were to submit proposals for garden makeovers to aid front line workers. Each chapter was to select a recipient and then carry out the makeover (a \$5,000 value) for the individual or family. Later, LO plans to select a recipient for a *Grand Garden Makeover* estimated to be worth \$25,000.

The Windsor Chapter selected the family of a front-liner couple in Amherstburg that consists of a firefighter, his wife who is a nurse, and two children. The husband recently decided to step back from work to take care of their children while his wife is undergoing cancer treatment.

Members of the LOWC have met with the couple and prepared a landscape design that they loved. The project will get under way in the spring of 2021. The final product will be worth more than \$5,000. All labour will be in-kind while some of the plants and materials will be donated by local landscapers and garden centres. Earlier in 2020, LOWC helped with a fund-raising event that provided the family with some additional funds that were donated towards the project. These funds will go towards the cost of building a gazebo and for outdoor furniture to complete the project.

The LOWC are looking forward to completing the project in the spring of 2021. So watch for this on the news and in the paper in 2021. *

New Student Residence Under Construction

An Open House was held Thursday, November 13, 2020 to provide a sneak peek at the new \$23-million GEM student residence under construction on St. Clair College's South campus. When completed, the 106,000 square foot structure will house 512 students and has been described as one of the most innovative student residences in North America.

This unique building is being constructed with prefabricated units produced by Z-Modular, a Zekelman Industries subsidiary company. Up to 90 per cent of the modules are built in the company's Kitchener factory and are then transported to St. Clair College and hoisted into place with cranes.

"Strictly from the perspective of the unique construction method, in addition to being a residential complex, this is going to prove to be something of an educational site," said College President Patti France. "I have no doubt that our faculty and students in such programs as Architectural Technology, Interior De-



sign, Civil and Construction Engineering Technology and several other trades-related fields will be examining the modular construction method for many years to come."

Ribbon Cutting Event Officially Opens the New Sportspark


On Tuesday, November 17, 2020, St. Clair College's new, \$26 million Sports Park, described as "a gamechanger" in the landscape of collegiate athletics was officially opened with a ribbon-cutting event. The new Sports Park features a 1,500-seat Soccer and Football stadium, a women's softball diamond, the four-court Zekelman Tennis Centre, and a sand Volleyball complex.

The Zekelman Tennis Centre is a standalone building within the Sports Park complex, and only one of a few hundred indoor tennis facilities in the country.

The fully lit stadium features artificial turf and a press box. The field will be the

home of the women's and men's varsity soccer teams, as well as home for the St. Clair Fratmen Football franchise.

President Patti France praised the Student Representative Council and the Saints Student Athletic Association for their commitment to seeing the Sports Park to its completion. France said the student government groups would be responsible for the day-to-day management of the complex. **

Verifying The Authenticity Of SCCRA E-mail

A recent e-mail was concerned about the authenticity of a SCCRA broadcast.

Here's what to look for in a legit message:

From Address: retireeassociation@stclaircollege.ca (or sretiree@stclaircollege.ca) You might see additional text "via cp20.com" in some cases.

Subject: From the SCCRA - There might be the odd exception (caused by brain freeze) but this phrase (plus the hyphen) will start the subject header.

Reply-to address: The return address will contain the address CP20.COM used by our mail provider Campaigner. (Ignore the gibberish – it's an internal name which redirects to a SCCRA e-mail address; for example sretiree@stclaircollege.ca)

Trouble viewing this e-mail? If you hover over the link, you will see the address http://secure.campaigner.com

And of course... the **bottom info block (footer):**

St. Clair College Retirees Association 2000 Talbot Rd. W Windsor Ontario N9A 6S4 Canada You are subscribed to this email as <u>your email address</u> Click here to modify your <u>preferences</u> or <u>unsubscribe</u>.

Click on **Preferences** to add or delete e-mail lists or change some personal information. You may not be able to remove all <u>sublists</u> but still want to remain a member for future inclusions. You can therefore click on **Unlisted** to reserve your 'spot' without unsubscribing.

Click on **Unsubscribe** if you want to leave the SCCRA e-mail list. Note that I cannot restore your subscription if you change your mind. You have to do that yourself. Save the last broadcast and you can use it to reconnect.
